A Gun That Shoots Knives

This pretty bizarre, mostly entertaining and incredibly catchy blend of musical styles will take place on Friday, September 15th at 9 p.m.

No subject is taboo for AGTSK. On their website, they describe their variety of songs as, "entirely unique and completely original," including the topics, "Robocop, robots, robot spiders, the benefits of soap, how to kill lizardmen, dwarves, coalminers, the US postal system, falling off your skateboard, cake made from ice cream,

chinese puzzle boxes, literacy, etc. etc." Basically, if the guys from They Might Be Giants grew up obsessed with Star Wars and 50s creature features, then took a

bunch of drugs while listening to Cake and Frank Zappa, they'd almost certainly

make music similar AGSK. That description probably doesn't help much, does it? OK, if you had to compare AGTSK to bands that actually exist, Ween, The Dead Milkmen and Beck come to mind, especially Stereopathic Soul

Manure-era Beck, where he was writing songs like "Satan gave me a Taco" and "Jaggermeister Pie."

I think what we like most about this band is that there's obviously a lot of musical talent here, especially as far as the piano and guitar is concerned, but they don't let it affect their unpretentious and amusing



style. In fact, their ability to write catchy tunes complimented by some rockin' instrumentation only enhances their sound – it's an unorthodox range, but it's an impressive combination nonetheless. It's like the approach that The Presidents of the United States take to their music only with actual, you know, talent.

A Gun that Shoots Knives will be sandwiching a pair of Seattle performances with a single Spokane concert at The Spread on Friday, September 15th. I wouldn't rule out the possibility of this 21 and over show involving chicken costumes, Transformer references and/or a samurai sword. Seriously, anything is possible and, as such, is our choice as your best entertainment bet in Spokane over the next couple of weeks.



30 Second CD Review: Papa Glenn

Welcome to the 30 second CD review – if you time yourself and find that the review takes longer than 30 seconds to read, try reading faster. Going to Ritzville, recorded by Papa Glenn & the Border Run Blues Band is a good, recorded representation of a form of music that should only be listened to live... and outside, preferably during the evening as the sun is setting (and with a cold beer in your hand).


As you can probably guess from the band's name, they play blues with a big band feel. Papa Glenn, who has a great blues voice, trades off lead with the prominent horns section, lead by Craig Landron. When Glenn isn't singing, the horns are. This combination makes for a very danceable concoction.

But as I said before, blues rock should only be listened to live and outside. When I first started doing this review, I was sitting

in a basement at my computer and not digging the music at all. To test my theory I unhooked my laptop, went to the back porch, cracked open a PBR and voila, suddenly Going to Ritzville jumped out at me.

The music is what you would hear on any blues record, but one track stands out - when Boss Man first came up I almost swore that I was listening to the Michael Jackson's Billy Jean; the melody was identical. Then there is Going to Ritzville, which is a stupid name for a song – there is no reason to go to Ritzville...

The SiDEKiCK knows of no place you can actually buy this album as the band does not have a known website, so if you are itching to get you hands on Going To Ritzville, you will have to go see Papa Glenn perform live (preferably outside, during the evening, with a cold beer in hand) and ask him yourself.

The final show for 10 Minutes Down

After nearly a decade spreading a love of ska in Spokane and beyond, 10 Minutes Down is playing their final ever show at the Big Easy on Saturday, September 9th. Joining 10 Minutes Down for their last performance will be Spokane dynamos Man of Action, RAWK Final Four winner Vax Lavala, and rainy city punks Poorsport.

10 Minutes Down, like so many local bands, started when a group of Gonzaga students got together, picked up some instruments and started playing music, in their case to introduce the people of Spokane to the completely nonexistent genre of ska. Their name comes from a famous Andy Warhol saying that everyone gets 15 minutes of fame – but these guys only wanted to use up 10 of those minutes. The original plan was to play three gigs and then break up; however, after an overwhelming response following their opening performance at a *Save Ferris* show

in October of 1998, they changed their minds. Eight years, countless shows and some 40 band members later, 10 Minutes Down is still in Spokane, fostering their love of ska and bringing it to their appreciative audience base.

While the band has used up 10 minutes of fame, they still have 5 minutes



LIVE MUSIC **DMX** headlines night of rap

Some of the biggest names in rap will be stopping in Spokane as part of the highly touted Walk These Dogs Tour '06. DMX, Bone Thugs 'N Harmony, Tech N9ne and Rebel Music Crew will be playing at the appropriately named Star Theater on Wednesday, September 20th at 7:30 p.m.

Earl Simmons, who wisely chooses not to go by Earl in his hardcore rap life - instead performing under the stage name DMX - has seen a popularity that is, in a way, unrivaled in music history. His first five albums all debuted at #1 on the Billboard charts - something that's never happened before or since – while his sixth and most recent album came in at a "disappointing" second on

the charts. (Sadly, the compilation NOW 22 took the #1 spot that week, which has to make DMX feel a little like Steven Colbert after he lost to Barry Manilow at the Emmy's a couple of weeks ago.) At any rate, DMX, the undisputed

king of hardcore rap today, is touring for the first time in four years, and will be joined by a number of other heavy hitters in the rap world.

The Rap Sheet

While **DMX** undeniably has his place in contemporary music, he's also had, shall we say, a bit of trouble with the law. Here, then, is a list of run-ins with police that DMX has incurred on his way to stardom. Some might consider this list in bad taste, but I would argue that a certain criminal element is part of his appeal:

1999 - Sentenced to make public service announcements for the Humane Society after pleading guilty to charges of animal cruelty, disorderly conduct and possession of drug paraphernalia when police found a pistol, crack pipe and 13 pit bulls on the premise of his New Jersey home.

2003 - Released on \$376 bail after swearing during a concert on the island of St Kitts and Nevis in the Carribean, allegedly breaking a contract stipulating there would be no indecent language on stage.

2004 - Driver's license was suspended and his 1998 Ford Expedition was impounded following an incident were he was arrested in New York for allegedly attempting to steal a car while impersonating a federal agent. After being held on charges of attempted

robbery, criminal impersonation and criminal mischief, he pleaded guilty to reckless endangerment and was sentenced to a conditional discharge

2005 – A pair of traffic violations in the state of New York landed DMX a 60-day prison sentence. In April, he was arrested for driving with a suspended license after crashing his car into a police

cruiser while, in October, he was clocked at driving 104 miles per

> 2006 - Cited with a "caution," a British law term essentially stating that he has accepted responsibil-

ity for unruliness and a record will be made of an incident following his arrest at a London airport where he caused a disturbance by refusing to put on a seat belt and became abusive on the flight over from New York.

The other Walk These Dogs performers haven't had the criminal encounters of the headliner, with the notable exception of Bone Thugs N Harmony member Flesh-N-Bone. In 2000, he was sentenced to 11 years in prison on various gun charges, including armed assault and illegal possession. He's currently being held in the Pleasant Valley State Prison in California, and is eligible for parole in 2008.





The Melvins' music is influenced by Black Flag's *My War* era punk, slow rock acts like Flipper and The Swans, and, notably Black Sabbathstyle metal, but their idiosyncratic approach, bizarre sense of humor, and experimentation make neat categorization difficult. The Melvins

often favor slow tempos, and their sludgey sound was a strong influence on grunge music, especially Nirvana and a number of other Seattle area bands.

Both bands give off a sinister vibe that casts a darkness over their non-traditional blues style so maybe their sound would best be described as dark blue or midnight blue or, well, you get the idea. 



Out in the open Open Mic Nights a weekly fixture at Spokane bars

While the flow of local bands playing around town, coupled with the big names that come through the Inland Northwest on a regular basis, are indicative to the health of our fair city's music scene, perhaps it's a town's Open Mic Nights that will give you the best idea of how healthy that scene really is. After all, if regular Joe's are turning out in droves just to be a part of it all, that speaks pretty highly for its virility. If that's the case, then, Spokane is doing just fine.

Aspiring musicians can take the stage five nights a week to get a glimpse of the spotlight, iron out that new song, or simply expose a new audience to music that might normally be reserved for friends around a campfire. Here's how the open mic scene breaks down in Spokane.

Monday

Spokane's Original Open Mic

Night is held at the Blue Spark, on the corner of First and Howard, every Monday. Perhaps the most sacred and maybe the most eclectic of the open mic nights around town, performers are granted 15 minutes of stage time before the next act comes on. All night, from 9:15 to 1:30 a.m., singers, songwriters and musicians of all shapes and sizes show off their abilities at the oldest open mic night in town. Throw Uncle Randall's Dance Party into the mix and the result is unique and full of energy.

Tuesday

Tuesday sees a pair of open mic opportunities in downtown Spokane, with The Boulevard and Caterina Winery getting in on the action. Rock Coffee Presents Open Mic at the Ca**terina Winery** starts at 7, with performer signup held an hour earlier. Drink and appetizer specials are on hand all night and host Thomas Bechard makes sure that things move along smoothly (for more on Bechard's solo performance at the Winery with a pair of fellow singer/songwriters on Friday, September 8th, turn to page six of this issue).

The Boulevard kicks their festivities off at 9 p.m. for an 18 and over night of amateur performances. Their mix is an assorted one to be sure – featuring everything from full bands to guys playing didgeridoos to poetry readings and, of course, solo acts where a Spokanite takes the stage with his or her guitar. Basically, everyone is invited to play whatever they want. Performers should show up about a half hour early to sign up.

Wednesday

The newest member to the Open Mic family around town is

Brooklyn Nights, who's kicking off their weekly event for the first time in September. Every Wednesday, from 8 to 10, anyone 21 and over is welcome to head down to the bar and play in the intimate atmosphere of Brooklyn Nights, located in the alley behind Far West Billiard.

Gonzaga University also holds an open mic night some Wednesdays throughout the school year. Every week, students organize a Coffee House event in the Crosby Student Center, sometimes bringing in performing bands and sometimes allowing the students to create some music of their own. The first open mic night of the fall semester is scheduled for September 27th.

Thur sday

Ionic Burrito spices up their Mexican food with a little live music on Thursday and Friday nights. Fridays are reserved for performing acts, however the microphone is pretty much a free-for-all on Thursdays. Every week, starting at 6 p.m., local musicians are encouraged to head down to the corner of Hamilton and Sinto near the Gonzaga campus with a guitar or, you know, whatever. They also have burritos that weigh in at five pounds - which sounds kind of like a punishment – but then again you can always wash it down with one of the many beers they serve.

Medley's Lounge in the Spokane Valley also holds an open mic night and acoustic jam of its own. Sort of in a limbo period right now until they

Saddle up for the 2006 Spokane Interstate Fair

When the air starts to cool and the fieldburning smoke clears the horizon, it can only be one time of the year - time for cotton candy, carnies, and cows. The Spokane Interstate Fair is back for its 55th year with more of everything you have grown to love. The fair begins on Friday, September 8th and goes everyday until Sunday, September 17th – the gates open at 10:00 a.m. everyday and festivities last until 10:30 p.m. every evening. All festivities take place at the Spokane County Fair & Expo Center located on the corner of Broadway and Havana - for specific directions look online at www. spokanecounty.org/fair. With over 14,000 exhibits and more scheduled events than we can ever possibly hope to fully explain, what you do each day is up to you.

Tickets

By the time you are reading this article it is already too late to get the discounted passes available at local businesses, but admission at the gate it quite reasonable so don't get too upset. Day passes for adults are \$8, seniors are \$5, youths 7-13 are \$5, and kids 6 and under get to pet the goats for free. Admission includes everything the fair has to offer except for events in the Grandstand. Tickets for grandstand events are available at the door.

The Oregon Museum of Science and

Snakes at the Fair

Industry, better known as OMSI, is making the trek to Spokane in order to set up a special exhibit that's intended to stimulate kids interest in something other than MySpace. The hands-on displays will include puzzles, skulls, pelts, rocks, bones, geckos and snakes – all of which the children, and parents, are invited to touch. The display will be up for the entire duration of the fair.

Bulls, Broncos & Belt Buckles

No fair is complete without a rodeo – good thing that a PRCA sanctioned rodeo event is taking place in the Grandstands or the fair organizers would really be in trouble. This year's



events take place on Friday and Saturday, September 8th and 9th at 6:45 p.m. and on Sunday, September 10th at 4 p.m. Expect to see bareback riding, barrel racing, bull riding, tie-down roping, bronco busting, steer wresting, team roping and a lot of really shiny belt buckles. Additional tickets are required for these events but they can be

> purchased at the door, priced at \$5 for reserved lower-level seating or \$2 for upper-concourse general seating.

Fair Factor

Ever watch that NBC TV show "Fear Factor?" – well you can probably guess what Fair Factor is all about. The Fair's version of the slightly perverse program will pit 100 people against their worst fears for a chance to win four season passes to Silver Mountain Ski Resort. Over the course of 10

rounds, the contestants will be narrowed down until only 10 remain. While most of the contestants have already been selected, a wildcard participant will be selected each day at 4 p.m. from the "enter to win" box located on the South lawn of the Fair Factor Arena. The main stipulations for those who enter is that you are 18 or older, have a death wish/no gag reflex, and own a cell phone. The contest take place everyday, but the final round will be held on Sunday, September 17th at 10:30 a.m. - don't miss this chance to watch your fellow fair goers do really gross things.

Driving with a Helmet

If you ever see someone driving with a helmet, you are either looking at a precautious narcoleptic or you are in the middle of a demolition derby. A demolition derby, for those of you who don't know, is an event where a group of cars contained within an arena try to disable the other vehicles through physical collisions; the last car standings wins. You have two chances to see the mayhem, first on Saturday, September 16th at 6:45 p.m. and again on Sunday, September 17th at 4 p.m. Both events take place in the grandstands and require an extra fee. Bring a blanket and a primal desire to watch things get destroyed.

Stuffed Frogs and Cabbage

To most people the fair means only one thing - amusement rides. This year is no different. All of the favorite rides will be on hand, as well as those horrible games that seem really, really simple and offer you a plethora of prizes that are designed to elevate you in the eyes of young women but are nearly impossible to win and will drain all of your money until you realize it would have just been cheaper to go to the store and buy one of those stupid stuffed frogs in the first place – those damn tricky Carnies. While the rides have a pay as you go option, you may also purchase a wristband entitling the bearer to unlimited rides. Wristbands cost \$20 on Sept 8th, 11th, 12th, 13th, and 14th and \$25 on all other nights.

Fast Food

Why did the pig race around in a circle? Because being the source of family entertainment is slightly better than being a source of protein at a family breakfast. The ever-popular Cook's Racing Pigs are back and will perform four times a day, every day during the fair. Spectators can pick a pig, and if it wins than the observer is entered to win a "Cook's Racing Pigs" T-Shirt. The show is not only exciting but it also offers interesting agricultural education while promoting the pork industry and the humane treatment of farm animals.

Aural Pleasure

While the fair will feature music everyday on the stages scattered throughout the complex, the main action will happen at the Grandstand. The first of these big shows is **Lee Greenwood** who will perform on Monday, September 11th at 6:45 p.m. He is best known for creating the 80s hit "God Bless the USA" - this dude really loves him some freedom. The following night, Tuesday, September 12th, the Oak Ridge Boys hit the Stage at 6:45 p.m. Their bio was longer than I really wanted to read so here is a random quote from roughly the middle; "Oaks baritone, Steve Sanders, had been dealing with many problems (including several with his ex-wife) and those problems were increasingly becoming problems for all of the Oaks."

For a double dose of blonde, head to the Bomshel concert on Wednesday, September 13th at 6:45 p.m. at the Grandstands. 

The Wicker Man a successful failure of a film

I don't know anything about Spokane native and immensely talented writer/director Neil Labute's background, but he seems pretty butt hurt about some chick from his past. While The Wicker Man is definitely a psychological horror/thriller – something of a cross between *The Village* and *Village of the Damned* – that seems to have little bearing on why he made the film in the first place. I don't know if anything has ever been called antifeminist before, but this movie almost certainly qualifies.

Labute is clearly obsessed with the emasculation of the male in contemporary society. His debut film, In the Company of Men, explicitly addressed the subject in an urgent and extraordinary way, while his latest offering allows it to be thinly veiled throughout. And I hate to get too academic here, but I simply don't see any other way to read the movie. The story of Nicholas Cage searching a mysteriously pagan island for a missing girl is completely secondary to the world that the women of the island have created. Cage doesn't fit into their world and he knows it. As a result, Wicker Man works on some level, but almost completely fails to stand on its own.

Relatively unknown actress Kate Beahan has a fair bit of screen time as Cage's love interest, though he's really too impotent to have much sway in that department. Regardless, she's nice to look at, which is a hell of a lot more than I can say about virtually anyone

else on the mysterious island where they spend the vast majority of their time.

Unfortunately, Nicholas Cage is also in this movie. Not that he's necessarily all that bad, just that he suffers from what I call "The Nicholas Cage Corollary." The basic theory is that Nicholas Cage does one thing and one thing only – he plays Nicholas Cage. Don't get me wrong,

he does it well; nobody can play Nicholas Cage quite like Nicholas Cage, but that's about all the range he's got. He's not alone either; other notable actors suffering from the Nicholas Cage Corollary include Ethan Hawke, Pierce Brosnan and Tom Hanks who, even when acting like a retarded person, is still vintage Tom Hanks.

At least in *The Wicker Man* you get to see Nicholas Cage wearing a bear suit, which is funny on at least three levels. OK, actually it's only funny on

one level – that he looks frickin' absurd – but it's ridiculous enough to count for three in my book.

All in all, *The Wicker Man* isn't that good of a movie. There's a nice twist at the end but, as a self-contained film – that is story, plot, characters, acting and the like – it's kind of hard to go along with. The only way to truly enjoy *The Wicker*

Man is if you're a raging film geek and closet Neil Labute fan like I am, and willing to tease out the gender relation themes. And, if there's one thing I learned from four years in film school, it's that almost nobody is willing to do that.

AMC Select brings a bit of diversity to Spokane film scene

Like it or not, moviegoers in Spokane must deal with the large, national chains when heading out to see a film. Sandpoint's quaint Panida is great, but it's a drive. And while the off-again, on-again Magic Lantern art-house theater downtown is supposed to be making another comeback soon, by and large your choices are AMC or Regal. And it's not much of a choice, since their weekly film schedules are practically mirror images of each other.

But things changed earlier this summer, as AMC quietly rolled out its AMC Select program. Dedicated to what AMC calls *specialty films* (films of limited runs, typically 1,200 prints or less), AMC Select began screenings in May in AMC's River Park Square theater.

As a result, indie fare such as "A Prairie Home Companion" "An Inconvenient Truth" and "A Scanner Darkly,"

have screened here when they otherwise would have passed over normally tame, homely Spokane.

"Before we launched AMC Select we were consistently playing specialty product at AMC River Park Square 20," explains AMC rep Melanie Bell. "The Spokane market has played this type of product well."

Taking into account this positive historical trend as well as other local competition for specialty films (eh, not much), AMC brought its Select program to River Park Square, along with 70 of their other theaters across the country.

Bell says that another major factor in allowing this to happen is the sheer number of screens: 20 that exist in River Park Square. She says there's more flexibility and capacity to try things out, including "play[ing] the content that meets everyone's needs."

The macro reason for AMC's entry into specialty films is a case of supply and demand, says Bell. AMC has heard from increasing numbers of filmmakers wanting to produce

these kinds of films as well as from more consumers seeking a place to view them.

"It's absolutely out there and people want it," she says. "Guest feedback and industry feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. All of the independent studios ... have come out in support of the program and are excited to see that it is doing so well."

Indeed it is. According to Bell, AMC was the national market-share leader in seven of the eight highest grossing specialty titles during the program's initial seven weeks.

Now that you've heard all these terms about *market share*, *supply and demand* and theater size, it's obvious that AMC's new program is all about adding to the company's bottom line by expanding its business line. It's unlikely that the theater behemoth is suddenly embracing its inner hipster.

But whatever the motivation, the fact is that films which otherwise wouldn't have come to Spokane are now being shown. Filmgoers now have more options, and that can't be a bad thing.

Hackers

A geeky film from an awkward period. Where do I sign up?

Hackers is a movie that nobody should remember and almost certainly doesn't need to be reincarnated. If it goes down in history at all, it'll only be because Angelina Jolie was in it before she could ever be accused of incest and/or witchcraft. But it's also one of the best historical documents about how mysterious and misunderstood the internet was at its inception, even if that documentation provides little more than bad clothes, awful stereotypes and sketchy technology.

Released in 1995, *Hackers* is a perfect example of how dumb we all looked in the 90s. Its as awkward a period as any I can remember, the 80s or middle school included, except that we haven't really reached a point where we can laugh about it. We're all still in a stage where we sort of shake our heads and let a pregnant pause fill the air before uncomfortably steering the subject away from rat tails and cross colors. But *Hackers* might help break down that clumsy barrier, because it's pretty hilarious in a completely unintentional way.

The film revolves around the title group of friends railing against an evil, skateboarding hacker who's systematically setting them up for a crime they didn't commit. The whole point of the movie was clearly to capitalize on the popularity and completely unknown powers of the upstart internet, which is represented by cheesy-looking data that's

literally flying through the air. The graphics are rivaled only by the perceptions of cool in a time period that was

decidedly not. Trying to glorify an era when roller-skating was hip and cross colors were king is like trying to reach the moon in a Volkswagen; it's just not going to happen.

The saddest part about *Hackers* is that I kind of like it. I mean who doesn't want to be a part of something communal like a global network of computer geeks bent on overthrowing an overzealous authority system. That the movie sucks on many, many levels makes it – not necessarily difficult to enjoy – simply embarrassing to admit.

And I know that it's a copout to claim enjoyment from a movie and then say that you like it in spite of yourself – as if I'm allowing myself to partake in an indulgence that I feel above – but in *Hackers* case there's no other way to describe it. There are a few things working in

its favor – a bit of excitement, a well-crafted soundtrack the few times there's any music at all, and some found footage

stuff at the beginning that sets it up as a film that's much more visually interesting than it turns out to be. But ev-

erything – and I mean *everything* – else is working against it: acting, characters, dialogue, and story come to mind, though that certainly isn't a comprehensive list.

The bottom line is that *Hackers* ultimately succeeds, just not on the level it intends to. It tries, and fails miserably, to be an edgy, super-cool movie, yet stands neither the test of time nor, I doubt, any mid-90s perception of cool either. As a sort of feel-good, anti-authoritarian tale of friends, however – as well as a laughable artifact from the age of parachute pants and *Saved by the Bell* – it kind of works.

find a replacement host for Chuck Dunlap, local musicians are still invited to head down on Thursdays from 8 to midnight and jam out on the full band set up at Medley's Lounge, 14415 E. Sprague in the Spokane Valley.

While Friday and Saturday are reserved for many of the concert opportunities at many of the venues around town, the weekend winds down with an open mic invitation for budding comedians.

The Brickwall Comedy Club instills a no-heckling policy on Sunday nights and

opens up the microphone to anyone willing to stand up and tell a few jokes. The event kicks off at 8 p.m., but participants should arrive earlier to register.

These communal nightly events happening five nights a week in Spokane and the Spokane Valley are highly entertaining and, best of all, they're free – with many of the venues providing food and/or drink specials while local amateurs are performing.

Sometimes the music is better reserved locked away in a basement, but sometimes the sheer volume of talent stemming from these relatively unknown musicians is mind-blowing. For the price of a few beers and some relaxing hours spent with friends, that's a risk I'm willing to take.


But why take that risk?



Slew of September events happening at Auntie's Bookstore



Main Dish: The Elk Public House

When I was first told about The Elk, located on Cannon Street in Browne's Addition, I pictured a small dive bar in a dark part of Spokane whose wood panel walls are so covered with crap that they make the Blue Spark look sparsely decorated. I was wrong.

This funky, fun bar & grill is a place that you could easily take a date for a nice dinner or meet up with co-workers at 5 (or noon for that matter) for a pint of microbrew. While the menu is somewhat limited in the amount of food choices, it is definitely not limited in the variety. With thirteen main dishes that range from Seattle inspired 7th St. Gumbo, to Marinated Pork Soft Tacos, and back around to the staple Ruben sandwich, you can pretty much find something on the menu to fill your cravings.

Every time I go to The Elk I forget they don't serve fries – disappointment quickly sets in. My brain says, "I don't want corn pasta – it sounds like something you find at a pot luck that you only eat to be polite."

But when the pasta comes I instantly forget my beef. The stuff is like heroine and/or Moun-

tain Dew – which is to say highly addictive. More pasta than corn, the substance has a zing that makes my mouth tingle, but keeps my eyes from watering. My stomach (and arteries) thank The Elk for this lack of deep fried options.

As for the main dishes, they are really, really good, but be warned – if you order the special and fall in love, it may not be there to satisfy you the next time you feel-the-need (Oh, chipotle steak sandwich, how I miss you). A good staple is the Marinated Soft Pork Tacos, which will never leave you, and are covered in a refreshing mango/pineapple chutney sauce and stuffed with some pretty incredible coleslaw.

One thing I have noticed is that service is quicker inside the restaurant than on the porch. Basically if you want to enjoy the sun and the beautiful Cannon Street neighborhood, you will be given ample time to do so. If you are in a hurry, head inside to the air conditioning and, while you're at it, pick up a copy of the SiDEKiCK.

Back Burner: Piccolo's Italian Deli

Every once in a while you find a great little out of the way place that serves some of the best food you've ever eaten – Piccolo's Italian Deli is one of those places. Tucked deep behind this great little family owned-and-operated market is a small, very intimate Italian restaurant run by the same family.

The restaurant has only one waiter, who also gives a hand at the cooking and hosting duties. Unfortunately, since the publishing of this article, he has moved to Minnesota – but I imagine his replacement will be just as pleasant. He has always remembered me every time I've come back to enjoy their fare, even when it's been a couple of months between visits. This kind of service makes you feel warm in fuzzy inside, or maybe it's just the carafe of wine talking.

With several traditional Italian dishes to choose from, the selection is by no means extensive, but it does encompass the gamut of Italian food. The few things they do cook they do well. Two of my favorite dishes are the Puttanesca and the Lasagna. The Puttanesca comes with a red sauce filled with garlic, roasted tomatoes, olives, and capers - a veritable flavor explosion in your mouth. You have your choice of pastas, but I prefer the penne with this dish. Then there is the Lasagna. Its rich, cheesy gooeyness is a treat for the lasagna lover in us all. With several kinds of cheeses and Italian sausage layered between thick pieces of pasta, you'll have a trail of cheese from your plate to your fork the majority of the meal.

Besides the wonderful main dishes that Piccolo's has to offer, each meal is served with salad, soup, and garlic bread – the latter of which is worth dying for. Every time I've gone, we've had to order an additional basket of bread because it gets snapped up as fast as it's placed on the table. I would also recommend the Chianti wine to accompany your meal. Their generous carafes are reasonably priced, and the wine goes excellent with these fabulous Italian dishes.

Piccolo's has great food, a personable atmosphere, and excellent service, and is a place that I recommend highly for the next night you plan to eat out. Not to mention, any establishment where three people can have a four-course meal with a couple glasses of wine and get out for under \$40 rates very high in my book.

relaxing wind-down to a weekend of physical exertion.




