Gosling is headlining the show, finally hitting their stride after undergoing some pretty severe changes over the past couple years. Originally a hard rock outfit from the tri-cities area called *Loudermilk*, they've since modified their sound to a much more radio friendly, alt-rock vibe, moved to Los Angeles and changed their name.

Their first full length album under the Gosling title, *Here is* ..., was released earlier this year with standout tracks that include "Stealing Stars," an astonishingly mind over our self-imposed Thanksgiving holiday, as he also created a **widget** for the Spokane SiDEKiCK! That probably



With their complete overhaul, Gosling has proven to be stripped down yet epic rock at its most pop friendly and best.

Village Green is also on the bill for the evening, bumped up a spot after co-headliners Strata had to pull out. Being rabid Kinks fans, and sheepishly admitting we'd heard

almost nothing from any of these bands as recently as a couple weeks ago, Village Green was the first group to catch our attention. They also get a lot of play time out of our computers' speakers, sounding and looking every bit like a band who're trying ridiculously hard to be The Kinks in a time where that's as refreshing as it is impossible. Finally, **The Look** will get things going with their simple, sugar pop rock, a soft and more familiar ease into the evening.

In sumarry, then, after the unmistakably American sound of The Look, the last two acts are likely to provide the best imitation of Brit pop that you're going to hear in the Pacific Northwest. With Gosling as a poor man's Supergrass and Village Green as a poor man's Kinks, the two have set their sights high, but they've hit their marks. "Good artists borrow, great artists steal," as Picasso (I think) said, and these guys embrace that mentality to the fullest. That they also manage to craft their own sound in such a narrow framework is a testament to their talent.

This concert gets underway at 8 p.m. at the Big Easy, near the corner of Lincoln and 1st in downtown Spokane. Tickets are \$10, available through www.ticketswest. com, all the TicketsWest outlets listed on page 8, or by calling 1-800-325-SEAT. As with every Big Easy concert, this is an all ages show. Civilized Animal unleashes the beast at The Spread

Civilized Animal shows are like Halley's Comet, they only happen once very 75 years but when they do occur they are something to behold. Well Spokane, it may feel like an eternity since the last time these Spokane heroes have played but now is your chance. The Animal will be unleashed on Friday, December 8th at The Spread. Joining the band are fellow Spokane acts **The Jupiter Effect, The Carcinogens**, and singer/songwriter **J.S. Butcher**.

This seven-piece band mixes a seemingly infinite amount of musical styles and influences into their own

creation, pulling it off with a couple of saxophones, a trumpet and the usual guitar, drums, bass and vocals. It all adds up to a mix that Spokane fans have come to know and respect over the

past years, especially in their live performances where they promise to do everything short of burning the venue down.

It has been 7 years but this writer is finally ready to admit something – Civilized Animal popped my concert cherry. The first concert I ever went to was back in 1999 when I was still in High School. Civilized Animal was playing in Riverfront Park so I drove in from the Valley specifically to hear them play. It was wonderful – they were gentle yet firm and left me with a smile on my face.

Alien Ant Farm makes tour stop at The Blvd

Alien Ant Farm's career has been sort of a bummer. While the band enjoyed a large dose of success with their cover of Michael Jackson's "Smooth Criminal" and have a Billboard #12 album to their name, a fatal bus crash and record label collapse left the band in a funk from which the band is now just recovering. With a new record label and new album, Alien Ant Farm has gone back to their roots, back to plain and simple rock – back where they belong. The band will perform along with **The Urgency** (Brooklyn not Seattle) and **Silent Civilian** at The Blvd on Saturday, December 9th.

"In a sense I'm younger and more immature now," says singer-songwriter Dryden Mitchell, "We're having fun again."

Mitchell was the hardest hit by the tour bus crash in 2002. Suffering a fractured vertebra, Mitchell made a full recovery but suffered permanent nerve damage. "I lost some left-to-right motion but you'd never notice it at a show," he says.

Soon after the crash, DreamWorks, Alien Ant Farm's label, dissolved as a record company. Things began to suck for Alien Ant

Farm. You probably haven't heard from the band since roughly 2003 because no one's been listening to them. Due to the tragedies, the music had changed. The rock had stopped and people really liked the rock. With their new album, *Up in*

the Attic, released in July of this year, Alien Ant Farm is back on the radar and

back to their roots. The band has returned to its hard rocking yet melodic sound – a sound Mitchell lovingly calls "Nerd Metal."

"Being typical artists we wanted to 'mature and grow.' We wanted to say, 'See, we can play jazz chords or Latin.' But we're a rock band. We want cheeseburgers. We don't dumb anything down by any means but we're back to comfort food. This album sounds like us. It's not about evolving into something else; it's about being who we are," explains Mitchell.

Joining AAF is The Urgency out of Brooklyn. This indie-rock quartet has all of the energy and... urgency of Fallout Boy

> without being nearly as annoying. These guys are good and will probably be headlining with AAF opening for them in less than a year. Check them out at www.myspace.com/ theurgencymusic.com.

Rock the Bells, a "world class hip hop platform," is taking its show on the road, giving a chance for some of the biggest names and fastest risers in Southern California hip hop to showcase their talents on numerous stages across the nation. This event, now in its fourth year, is bringing

Redman, Raekwon, Keith Murray, Supernatural, DJ Kool and others to Spokane's Big Easy Concert House on Monday, December 11th.

The idea behind Rock the Bells is to "represent, respect and recognize" all aspects of

urban culture, celebrating it via its primary musical genre: hip hop. Since getting underway in 2003, Rock the Bells has brought Busta Rhymes, Mos Def, Talib Kweli, and a host of other notable rappers to a host of different national venues. More than just a concert, though, the goal is to be a one-day festival celebrating the whole hip hop lifestyle, with emcee battles, turntable exhibitions, vendor booths, multimedia screenings and surprise performances all a part of the Rock the Bells experience.

Redman headlines this year's festival, bringing a slew of hip hop notoriety in

the form of several Def Jam record releases, charted singles and notable collaborations. Included in these collaborations is the rap trio Def Squad, which also features Keith Murray, a rapidly rising musician who will be supporting Redman for all stops

Portland's Floater Releases New CD at The Blvd

Portland trio **Floater** is coming to Spokane to release their 8^{th} full-length album with the help of Coeur d'Alene's Melefluent. This 18 and older show will take place on Friday, December 15^{th} at 9 p.m. at The Blvd.

Floater is, by every definition, a modern rock band. There is no slashcountry, slash-reggae, or slash-punk about them – these three boys from Oregon play straight up rock 'n roll and have been doing so for roughly 12 years. The band's new release, *Stone by Stone*, features 14 all-new songs that continue to push the boundaries of rock and further define their already

polished sound. The album is available online at www. floatermusic.com for \$17, with the band's seven other releases also available on the website.

Opening for Floater is **Melefluent**, out of Coeur D'Alene. Labeling this trio's sound is as hard as trying to

decide to use "he" or "she" when referring to RuPaul. (On a side-note RuPaul has been quoted as saying, "You can call me he. You can call me she. You can call me Regis & Kathie Lee; I don't care!" I'm glad we cleared that up.)

Melefluent has a pleasant pop-rock base that sometimes comes dressed in reggae, and sometimes dons country licks. It really depends on the track. Generally, Melefluent plays music for people who like music. Adding to the bands sound is a lapsteel guitar. (There is something about a lapsteel that makes the SiDEKiCK all hot and bothered – I think maybe because



it's shiny.)

The band has recently returned from an East Coast tour that took them to the far end of I-90 and back. They will spend some time in the Northwest before deciding on a further course of action, so look for upcoming shows in the area on the band's myspace page (www.myspace.com/ melefluent). On a related note, Melefluent released a new CD, titled *Ways to Create*, this past August. The disc, along with the

band's debut release, is available on CDBaby.com, and is reviewed below this article.

This special show takes place at 9 p.m. on Friday, December 15th at The Blvd, located at 333 W. Spokane Falls Blvd in downtown, Spokane.

30 second CD Review: Ways to Create

Ways to Create, The sophomore release

from Coeur D'Alene's **Melefluent** is a good representation of the band's diversity and range. This aptly named disk should have a full title of *Ways to Create a CD That Spans Every Genre from Hip-hop to Funk* but that probably wouldn't have fit on the cover.

Pop tracks such as "Friends

Don't Let Friends Steal Friend's Guitars" strike a nice balance between catchy lyrics and rocking guitar solos, while in "Fine Women and Wine" the band takes a funkier approach that reminds me of Hot Action Cop (wow, what an obscure reference).

> Overall a really good disc with enough diversity to keep me interested through multiple plays, although I feel that some tracks get a little guitar heavy for my personal liking.



Contrary to my grandmother's most adamant assertions, Doug Clark does not have two heads and a forked tongue. Turns out he is actually a really nice guy. The SiDEKiCK caught up with Clark, lead singer of The Trailer Park Girls (a band that is neither from the park nor girls; not even one) at their recent concert at Pacific Pizza.

For anyone who doesn't know Doug Clark, he works as a columnist for the Spokesman Review and excels in bringing the hypocrisy of Spokane to light. His unapologetic editorials have gained him both notoriety and disdain, depending on who you're talking to (a police officer is most likely to

react with disdain). But this is not important; Doug Clark the columnist and Doug Clark the musician are different people and the former is of no consequence to this article.

"For years I never mentioned my name and I liked it that way," says Clark. "Whatever fans we gained have been just through the music."

The band is Doug Clark on guitar and vocals, Jeff Peterson on bass, Brian Drew on drums and occasionally Joe Brass on guitar. Former members include drummer Charlie Schmidt who is responsible for most of the band's "coolness factor," according to Clark. "Together they form a band the likes of which have never been seen, and they called themselves The Trailer Park Girls." Clark was happy to oblige and ended up writing 8 songs on his son's first album. When Clark's son moved to Seattle to peruse a career in music he gave all of the songs back, including the song "Trailer Park Girls." Peterson and Clark, who had been playing together in a cover band, decided that the time was right to start doing original material. Besides, they already had a theme song in "Trailer Park Girl," an anthem to clip-on-nail wearing, Jerry Springer watching, K-Mart shopping women everywhere.

Believe it or not music is not a new venture for Clark who spent three years in the music program at EWU before he dropped out of school, recorded an album, and hit the road to tour and play music. Unfortunately this didn't end well.

"I found that in my early 20's I had horrible stage fright that really stopped me from performing, so I went back to

school and changed my major in my last year to journalism," explains Clark.

Through the pressures of a deadline and screaming editors Clark's stage fright has vanished, completely. Clark, now 55, is now able to stand on stage and sing about Spokane's taboo topics without ever batting an eye. From the death of Otto Zem to the band's namesake song about trailer trash honeys, no

topic is off limit.

"With satire you take a risk that no one will get it or will take it literally," explains Clark. "Satire is the king of comedy."

Clark's poignant lyrics are backed by the sometimes blues, sometimes folksy, sometimes popish, but always-excellent musicianship of the Trailer Park Girls. And it's apparent that they love what they are doing – great music cant be forced, it just happens when all of the elements click.

The band will release their new CD of their latest work on Saturday, December 18th at The Blvd. This 18 and older show starts at 9 p.m. The Blvd is located at 333 W. Spokane Falls Blvd. in downtown, Spokane. You can also get a sneak peak of the album by attending any of the Trailer Park Girl's other shows over the next couple of weeks, first at Pacific Pizza on Friday, December 8th (all ages) and next on Thursday, December 14th at the Peacock Room (21+). 

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

The comic remains, in my opinion, probably the best representation of childhood I've ever seen and one of the smarter popular culture pieces of the past 25 years. One of my favorite strips sees Calvin weighing his pre-Christmas options for the 6,000th time, deciding whether he wants to be good in order to get a bunch of loot from Santa Claus, or whether he's going to be a mischievous little prick like he always is. At one point, Calvin posits the question "Is it better to hold fast and never back down, or to compromise?" To which his stuffed tiger and partner-in-crime Hobbes answers, "I suppose it's best to hold fast when you can and compromise when you need to."

Although Calvin admits, "That's a lot more mature than I think I care to be," it seems like an extremely commonsensical and basic truth that I try to follow. The idea of this column is to bridge the gap between the left and right, to find a common meeting ground that we can all agree upon, but there are certain times when I find it impossible to concede principles that

are generally associated with one side or the other. One such firmly planted idea is the whole "upholding the sanctity of marriage" thing, which is a sort of Orwellian term that sounds a hell of a lot better than saying you want to deny basic human rights to gay people. On this issue, I must confess that I side entirely with the left.

Gay rights is the next logical step in our slow but progressive evolution towards equality. Perhaps the idea of universal equality is taken too far, at times - I find certain Democratic notions like affirmative action counterproductive and over-the-top – but the idea that all people should be treated with the same basic kindness and afforded the same basic rights under the law seems so blindingly necessary that I often wonder why there's any objection to it in the first place. It's impossible not to acknowledge that the civil rights movement was good for not only the African American community, but for society in general. Even feminism, which I have certain reservations with, at least embraced the idea that women should have the right to participate in society with the same abilities as men, a prudent notion that lies squarely in the radical middle, even if it's traditionally associated with the leftist margins.

Besides, the battle is all but over. There will be equal rights for gay men and women someday. Homosexuality is not a passing fad and one generation – be it our children's, grandchildren's or what have you – is going to embrace the fact that these are human beings who only want to be acknowledged with the same distinctions as their heterosexual brethren. There's nothing nefarious about it. There's no gay agenda that's trying to permeate our children's minds. There's no secret society that's trying to win gay converts. There's nothing about it that is going to effect straight people in any negative way, and it's going to happen irregardless, so why fight it?

I truly believe that homosexuals deserve to seek the same happiness and security under the law that heterosexuals are afforded, but that's not the only thing that bothers me about this issue. I think what I find particularly distressing here is that when conservatives talk about "family values," they're almost exclusively talking about gay marriage. There's no other discernable difference between Democratic and Republican principles as far as the family unit is concerned. Yet this idea seems so integral to the conservative platform that it's swung recent elections towards the right and garnered thousands, if not millions, of votes on their behalf. I just refuse to believe that these are personally investigated ideals that are individually cherished when they seem a cut-and-dry example of adhering to a set of beliefs through mere association with a party platform.

Especially consider the recent hypocrisy of Colorado pastor Ted Haggard, one of the most outspoken opponents of gay rights, who was recently exposed by a male prostitute paying for sex and possibly doing crystal meth. (Wow, Ted. I guess if you're going to go down, it might as well be in flames.) Recently ousted Republican Senator Mark Foley also demonstrated some deep seeded homosexual tendencies when he tried to solicit a young male page. Clearly no straight man appreciates a male physique *that* much. What these two recent examples, and surely others like them show is that fighting perceived homosexual immorality is a political agenda and not a moral conviction in far too many cases.

You have the right to come to any conclusion about how you want to raise your kids and what values you perceive as right or wrong, but coming to those conclusions because you're coerced into thinking that being open-minded makes you a bad Christian or a bad Republican is disingenuous and without any of the value that comes from personal investigation. The whole point is to decide for yourself where you stand on this issue and, really, every issue. I'm thoroughly convinced that anybody who does so will find that a number of apparent convictions aren't nearly as strong as had been previously assumed.

Echoes from the OTHER Washington By M.W. Fritz

A civil war is defined as a war between political factions or regions within the same country. Why there is still debate as to whether the fratricide in Iraq constitutes civil war is slightly north of ridiculous.

This week Jon Stewart was at his satirical best in a crosstalk with his colleague John Oliver, the Daily Show's Senior Terror Analyst, about how the situation should be categorized.

Stewart: "3,000 Iraqis died just this month. Arguing over what to call it seems like semantic quibbling."

Oliver: "Semantic quibbling? I wouldn't call it that ... I'd say it's a minor linguistic flare up between two parties with different terminological points of view."

Stewart: "But why can't we just say, uh, call this a civil war?"

Oliver: "Because to American ears the

phrase civil war conjures horrible, jaw-dropping images of bloodshed panned across slowly by Ken Burns."

As depressingly funny as this exchange was, it illuminates the absurdity of the conversations taking place within the capital.

The continual locking of horns on how the situation inside Iraq should be defined, seemingly, takes precedence over how the war can be effectively concluded.

And the administration's insistence on referring to the conflict as "sectarian violence" (a favorite of the president) instead of civil war has finally reached its absurd apex.

Both the press secretary and the outgoing defense secretary remain steadfast that the warfare amongst Shiites, Sunni's and Kurds does not adequately define civil war. Which, Snow and Rumsfeld claim, is because there are few similarities between this conflict and the American Civil War. But in October, American and Iraqi epidemiologists estimated that 655, 000 Iraqi civilians have been killed since the U.S. invasion in March of 2003. That number, though considered inflated by some experts, is eerily close to the estimated number of Americans who lost their lives following southern secession.

It is reminiscent of President Clinton testifying he did not have sexual relations with a now infamous former intern, and then later stating he did not purge himself because he only engaged in oral sex. Okay, sure. Wonder how your wife defines oral sex?

Politicians and those who work for politicians are generally intelligent – or certainly love to think they are – people who enjoy peppering speeches with words that leave us scrambling for a dictionary.

But the national media (NBC News and The Los Angeles Times, most notably) when describing the Iraq War, is slowly starting to shift its vernacular from words like sectarian and strife and more towards words like civil and war. This is not a good prospect for a White House that has continually crutched upon former President Truman's advice that, "If you can't convince them, confuse them."

Unfortunately, we find ourselves ensnarled in a quagmire we can't win. But even more unfortunate is that Iraq has become an ideological battleground we can't afford to lose. Next week the bipartisan Iraq Study Group, according to the New York Times, will issue its report, calling for "a gradual pullback of the 15 American combat brigades in Iraq but stop short of setting a firm timetable for their withdrawal." And the Washington Post reported that the panel would also recommend "that all U.S. combat forces depart Iraq by 2008."

It's clear that nobody (Democrats, Republicans, the media or David Copperfield) know how to get us out of this mess. The debate, however, on what to call the mess in Iraq should be put to rest.

The Pentagon is deciding whether they want to Go Big, Go Long or Go Home. The tough sell will be convincing Americans we need more troops for a big, long civil war being fought a helluva long way from home.

Turistas a surprisingly tense and well crafted thriller

A college professor of mine was fond of warning us that "filmmaking is hard. Akira Kurosawa

made movies for 30 years ... And then they started to get good." With that in mind, I admire a flick that's modest in what it attempts to accomplish, yet pulls it off without any pretentions of being something it's not. Surprisingly, **Turistas** is such a movie.

I was not exited to see Turistas. I thought this was going to be merely a cheap explotation of American xenophobia with a few topless scenes thrown in to keep things moving. And it is, in a way. There are plenty of gyrating hips and jiggling breasts, usually in close up while some reggaeton is playing on the soundtrack. And does Turistas play off the jingoism and fears the American public? Almost certainly.



But I liked the film anyway. Not least importantly, this is a well-crafted movie that's, at times, visually explosive and usually manges to maintain some degree of authenticity, or at least the appearance of such. With the exception of lead actor Josh Duhamel, who's like Paul Walker without the charm (yikes), the rest of the young cast of attractive adventure seekers and tourists are perfectly decent. Thankfully, the level of disembowelments in Turistas is much higher than any I've experienced while traveling, but the filmmakers otherwise manage to create a

Brazilian setting that's somewhere between Girls Gone Wild and Village of the Damned without really forcing anything.

All that is secondary, or really complimentary, to the thriller plot that takes over about halfway through - a string of scenes that are somewhat ridiculous but exceedingly intense and completely engrossing. Turistas, then, turns out to be exactly what it's advertised as, a popcorn flick meant to entertain and frighten you, and it certainly accomplishes both. In that light, maybe leading in with a mention of Akira Kurosawa is completely in-

appropriate, but if you read this column with any regularity, you'll note that I'm none too happy with the quality of contemporary Hollywood moviemaking, and Turistas struck me as surprisingly refreshing on some level.

This is also due partially to it being a moderately intelligent movie. There's enough titillation playing off the American paranoia of other cultures to elevate Turistas to a slightly higher level than mere junk food for the brain. In the end, it ends up being both a condemnation and assimilation of American antipathy, both an understanding and rejection of other cultures' contempt towards the U.S. God, that sounds like *way* too academic of a reading for a modest thriller aimed at horny high schoolers and thrill seeking-college kids, but they really do manage to pull it off in a subtle and unassuming way.

I don't know, maybe I'm not being nearly hard enough on Turistas, but I think more than that I'm just so disenchanted of films failing to live up to their potential that it's exciting to see one that actually seems to excede it.

The Main Dish: Merq Liquid Lounge

The most insane deal in town can be found at the **Merq Liquid Lounge** at 706 Monroe, just north of the river. Every Tuesday, the Merq offers two hard shell tacos and a pint of PBR for \$2. That's right: \$2! At that price, I expected a couple of pathetic, frozen burrito-type products thrown on a paper plate, but, happily, this is actually a full meal for a scant two dollars.

We're talking two pretty good sized tacos, served with a healthy helping of rice and beans, and topped off with a Pabst Blue Ribbon, which is always a good choice, but is transformed into the best cheap beer on the planet when served out of the tap. I know Miller High Life claims to be the champagne of beers – and they're not far off – but really they're in a distant second; I'll put my money on PBR any day. (A ridiculous thing to be passionate about, I realize, but isn't the point of college to discover arbitrary biases like this?)

By the way, you can get a big ol' burrito instead of the tacos, if you want, which I usually do. Both are equally good in that Americanized Mexican food kind of way. You know exactly what you're getting and you won't be disappointed. Ever.

Did I mention that you get all of this for \$2?

I know, I know, I sound like a used car salesman here, a broken record trying to get you to buy something, and it probably comes off as disingenuous. But I sincerely like pretty much everything about the Merq. Even without their weekly taco special – which is becoming a Tuesday routine for the SiDEKiCK staff and rotating cast of friends – the Merq is one of my favorite local hangouts.

It's a spacious, attractive building that allows for any sort of evening you're looking for. The strikingly beautiful upstairs houses a fireplace, a couple pool tables and a warm, relaxing place to enjoy a few drinks. There's an outside patio that can't be beat (at least not once the temperature starts peaking above a balmy -8), a game room with a ping pong table and dart boards, and a main bar area that's staffed by friendly bartenders and lively entertainment – culminating with the frequent Drag Shows that take place on a sort of catwalk thing above the bar. Back Burner: El Gallo Giro

Living in Washington, one of the farthest states from the Mexican border, I am often surprised at how many authentic Mexican restaurants are in the area. And I couldn't be happier about it. Good, authentic Mexican cuisine makes me as happy as a fat kid eating cake. It may take years to get around to all of them in Spokane, but you have to start somewhere. By chance, my journey starts at El Gallo Giro.

Located on 3207 E. Sprague, El Gallo Giro is hard to miss, as the building is painted bright green. I'm going to let you in on a little secret. You can easily tell an authentic Mexican restaurant from a knock-off by inspecting the decor. The real deal tends to use a brighter color palette while Americanized versions stick to mute browns and tans. Case in point, Ell Gallo Giro's walls are bright blue while Azteca is a dull brown.

I walked into El Gallo Giro with every intention of ordering a taco so I could make some sort of comparison between our Main Dish and the Back Burner, but that quickly went out the window as I glanced over the menu. There were roughly 10 other dishes that sounded 100 times better than a taco. What can I say – tacos are good and all, but ordering a simple taco at an authentic Mexican restaurant is like going to a steak house and ordering a hamburger.

The tacos may have lost, but the enchiladas crema definitely won. Served with rice and beans and completely smothered in the rich crema sauce, this dish probably isn't the most healthy option, but it was so good that any negative health reprocusions were worth it.

Personally, I like my meal a little spicier than what was served. While this wasn't optimal for me, it worked out perfect for Brian, who is a complete wuss when it comes to spicy food. I was able to easily solve my spice dilemma with a little help from El Gallo's homemade hot salsa; the stuff was awesome! I am going to go so far as to say it was probably the best salsa I've ever had.

The variety I'm specifically talking about is the slightly greenish hot salsa, not the mild or the super hot stuff. The mild sauce is good (and I was too scared to try the super-hot habanero salsa), but the real standout was the hot salsa. It was definitely spicy but somehow managed not to literaly burn your mouth. The flavor lingered for a little before it disapeared compelely, allowing you to experience the feeling again.

The restaurant is clean and decorated beautifully – I almost felt like I was back in Latin America eating rice and beans at a soda ... until I looked out the window and saw it

Gonzaga Bulldogs bite back in 2006-2007

Being relatively knew to Spokane, I'm not the best guy to write an article about the Gonzaga basketball program. By all rights, this story should be penned by an old man who's lived here all his life and can talk about when Gonzaga was part of the NAIA, far from a household NCAA name. Certainly the Zags exploded onto the national scene with their run to the Elite Eight in 1999, but surely that isn't the only factor that transformed GU into the biggest team in all the inland northwest, and probably beyond.

However they got here, the Zags are clearly getting quite comfortable in their high profile role, rattling off five

straight WCC titles and as many consecutive NCAA tournament appearances. They haven't lost a conference game in 25 tries, and are in the midst of a 40-some game home winning streak; I've lost count of the actual number.

This looks to be a particularly exciting season for the Zags. Starting 8-1 and already boasting a pair of marquee wins over Texas and North Carolina, they've looked anywhere between good and great all season. After waltzing through a couple of NIT Tip-Off contests in the confines of the Spokane Arena, Gonzaga upended a much-hyped North Carolina squad in Madison Square Garden (a Tar Heels unit that was ranked behind only defending national champion Florida, and allegedly boasts the best player in the country in Tyler Hansbrough).

Their victory over Texas, while not quite as impressive on paper, is still a significant win over an upper tier Big 12 team. Pretty much controlling the pace from beginning to end (or at least before Texas closed out the game with a meaningless 18-0 run), Gonzaga proved that they're capable of containing anyone, in any atmosphere, on any night. While that sounds like one of those overused sports clichés that doesn't mean anything, it strikes me as an important observation for a small southeastern Washington school playing in the WCC.

With the exception of the Butler loss, they've looked pretty much fantastic, every bit as good as last year's team that was ranked fifth in the nation for much of the season. They might even be a little more well-rounded, unselfish, hungry and, as a result, a little bit better. It's surprising how well this program has coped with the transition between Cinderella story and na-

tionally recognized program, going from a team gunning for giants to a program where every team they face has them circled on the calendar from the moment the schedules are announced.

This year has been especially impressive, as a lot of people thought Gonzaga was nationally ranked based on name recognition and not roster talent, reeling from the loss of Adam Morrison and J.P. Batista. But that's clearly not the case. The

2006-2007 squad has come together nicely and is handling the pressure of playing a high profile non-conference schedule. With upcoming games remaining against Duke, Nevada and Washington before they even get to conference play, it should be a hell of a lot of fun for GU fans.

There's something appealing about being entertained with a familiar tale in the midst of Christmas, winter and the fading of the year. For sentimental saps like myself, then, Interplayers is reincarnating Charles Dickens classic Christmas Carol for the stage.

Four actors take on fourteen personas, performing against the backdrop of the modern stopwatch, keeping a stern cadence to the play and reducing the twohour story to a feverish 60 minutes.

But that's not really accurate, either, as audience interaction in the form of attendees performing the roles of wind, church bells and ghosts will allow for a certain amount of spontaneity. So, if I've got this right, A Reduced Christmas Carol is the timeless holiday story spun on its head and crammed into an hour that's both rigid and flexible, loose and precise.

You know what, just see for yourself and undoubtedly come up with a much better description than anything I just blathered about in the preceding paragraphs. The show goes on stage for the first time Wednesday, December 13th and runs through Saturday, December 23rd, with show times at 2 or 7 p.m., depending on the day.

The Spokane Symphony is celebrating the Christmas season with a pair of Holiday themed performances in December. The ever-popular **Nutcracker** starts things off on the 8th, with a **Holiday Pops** medley rounding out the festivities later in the month.

The Nutcracker will be on stage from Friday, December 8th through Sunday the 10th, with the Spokane Symphony providing a soundtrack for Ballet British Columbia and the Alberta Ballet, who will be acting out the theatrical portion of the show. The story revolves around a nutcracker coming to life in the form of a handsome prince, while toy soldiers battle an evil mouse king and a little girl is whisked from her Christmas Eve home to the valley of the sweets.

The original story, "The Nutcracker and the King of Mice," is credited to E.T.A Hoffman, who strikes me as one weird dude.
