







































Letter from the Editors

Legendary Merle Haggard visits Inland Northwest

Our goal here at the SiDEKiCK is twofold: to promote local artists and musicians and to point Spokanites in the direction of interesting events that these people are involved with. As such, for the most part we try to highlight upcoming concerts that have some sort of local ties. However, when a legend like **Merle Haggard** comes through town, joined by the immensely talented **Neko Case**, for an eclectic and borderline unmissable concert, we no longer have a choice as to what our Pick of the Issue is. This is it.

At first glance, pairing Merle Haggard with Neko Case sounds kind of like Kurt Cobain opening for Barbara Streisand. Not that Case is as tame as Streisand or anything like that, but the sultry lead singer of the New Pornographers warming things up for an old, gruff-voiced country master? We don't know what booking agents at Too Far North Productions were smoking but it's probably not a good idea to try and smuggle it past customs.

On second glance, however, the combination makes some semblance of sense. Wikipedia suggests that Haggard "almost single-handedly introduced country to the electric sound." Similarly, while Neko Case's intense fusion of alt-country within an undeniable rock 'n roll package might not be as groundbreaking, it's still got an analogously urgent, almost rebellious quality to it.

Though she's spent much of her life in Canada and various places outside the Pacific Northwest, Case is originally from Tacoma, and



returns to the general area on her latest national tour. Her Spokane performance will be the last of only four shows in which she's opening for the legendary Haggard.

It's almost impossible to fully encapsulate Merle Haggard's influence on American music. Occasionally referred to as the "godfather of country music," Haggard was one of the pioneers of the outlaw country movement and was really the first person to bring the fabled Bakersfield Sound to a national audience. Boasting a catalogue that includes such immediately recognizable hits as "Mama Tried," "Sing Me Back Home" and "Okie from Muskogee," Haggard has scored an incredible 40 #1 hits during his career that stretches back to the early 60s. With significant street cred (much of it stemming from pulling a notable stint in prison) and an indelible sound that's as refreshing now as it undoubtedly was in 1962, Haggard is a bonafide musical icon. Joined with the talented and formidable voice of Neko Case, this is a musical event that's truly deserving of the designation Pick of the Issue – one that's simply not to miss.

This concert takes place on Monday, February 12th at the INB Performing Arts Center, 334 W. Spokane Falls Blvd. Tickets are available now, priced between \$37.50 and \$47.50, on sale through www.ticketswest.com, by calling 1-800-325-SEAT, or by visiting any of the TicketsWest outlets around town (see calendar spread). SnoCore Tour brings an Army... of One

The SnoCore 2007 Tour is swinging through Spokane on Monday, February 19th, bringing with it heavy-hitters Army of Anyone, Hurt, Dropping Daylight and Neurosonic.

Army of Anyone has risen from the ashes of two of the most notable bands in

the mid 90s alt-rock scene. With Richard Patrick, former lead singer of Filter combining with the Deleo brothers, who comprised exactly half of Stone Temple Pilots, Army of Anyone had a foothold in the hard rock world before recording their first song. They foster this previous notoriety by covering

previous notoriety by covering notable STP and Filter songs during live sets.

Their first, self-titled debut album was released in mid-November last year, with the initial single "Goodbye," sounding a hell of a lot like a song straight out of the mid-90s STP catalogue, receiving significant airplay on modern rock stations across the country.

Hurt, an East Coast post-grunge outfit who came through the area last fall is also

returning to the Big Easy, this time as an opener. **Dropping Daylight** will go on stage beforehand with a set that's worth showing up on time for. Probably the best band performing, in my opinion, Dropping Daylight delivers a sound that mixes alt-Brit rock in the vein of Muse with the nu-metal sound that's gained a foothold in the States since sometime just before the turn of the century, pulling it off with

crashing pianos, thundering melody and, of course, power chords galore. **Neurosonic** will open the show with a distinctly, though relatively uninteresting, Southern California sound I would best describe as emoish alt metal.

This concert will be held at The Big Easy, 919 W. Sprague, on Monday, February 19th at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are on sale now for this all ages show for \$17.50 (\$19 at the door) available through www.ticketswest.com, by calling 1-800-325-SEAT, or by visiting any of the TicketsWest outlets around town (see page 12). 

LOCAL ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

LIVE MUSIC

Dave Hannon

From last summer's Acoustic Explosion festival to the present time, Spokane has become synonymous with acoustic music. Solo musicians doing their singer/songwriter thing have been cropping up from all directions with everyone coming from their own distinguishing backgrounds. While this enables a contrast to the stark hard rock genre that used to overpopulate the area, this new acoustic scene also is built with a nice community of musicians who truly wish to keep playing shows together and help each other out.

One of the many singer/songwriters rotating around the local venues, **Dave Hannon**, commented, "Spokane's a been a wonderful place to grow, write and be able

to play a lot more than probably I think I should or that I would in a bigger city. It feels like a huge family, and I know that's cheesy and cliché to say, but it really does feel like family. I love it."

Hannon's solo shows separate him from the masses with his musical style being rooted in three separate guitar genres.

"I really love soulful melodramatic guitar parts and some of the solo stuff that Rocky Votolato, Elliot Smith, and Colin Meloy do," Hannon remarks on his influences. "But then at the same time, I really like jazzy pop upbeat stuff. I'm really a mixture between the two."

So the first guitar approach is the melodic meets rhythm, the second is loud jazz, then what is the third?

"I played electric guitar growing up mostly," explains the former bassist of the now defunct local pop punk bank, Sittser. "And though it doesn't show in my music, a lot of my past influences are actually punk bands, Eddie Van Halen, and old shredders, Steve Vai and Stevie Ray Vaughn. All of those guys I just look up to as guitar heroes."

That concludes that the best way to describe Hannon's music would be as ambient jazz... stylistically. But that is not



Caterina All Ages, \$4 (509) 328-5069 completely set as he expects to continue evolving as a musician. Perhaps predicting two months ahead that he would join forces with Kristen Marlo to create the new acoustic-meets-electric band, Kristen Marlo and the Let Gos, Hannon adds, "Everything's

always changing, especially at this stage of the game. You could hear two separate versions of the same song one weekend to the next I want to keep the core of them, but if I could tweak it so it's better, I'm all about improvement. I'm a chameleon at this point; I'm still changing."

When I experienced Dave Hannon's music for the first time with Jonathan Nicholson at Caterina Winery, the venue's intimate community setting prevailed over the ambiance of the candlelight and quiet audience, a setting as relaxed as the live music. And once both musicians finished

Sweatshop Union's 7 MCs take the stage

Canada sucks. It's a sacred rule at the SiDEKiCK to never write about it, so we are just going to pretend that **Sweatshop**

Union (Vancouver, BC) is not from Canada, but instead from Seattle (they're not really). The seven piece hip-hop group will bring their socially conscious lyrics, highly dynamic beats, and high-energy live show to The Blvd House

of Music in downtown Spokane on Monday, February 12th. This Seattle band (really Vancouver) will be joined by Spokane rappers **Freetime Synthetic** (actually from Spokane).

Sweatshop Union began in 2002 as a collective of Vancouver-based artists pooling resources to release an album, transforming into a group during the process. The crew is made up of Kyprios, Marmalade, Itchy Ron, Metty, Mos Eisley, Dusty Melo, and Conscience, each an MC. Even

though their names sound like monikers of characters from a bad urban-themed movie about stomping, the seven MCs of Sweatshop Union transcend their individual labels to create a musical experience that really flows. Each member is able to blend their individual style with the sound of the group to create tracks that contain both highly individualized verses and well-blended choruses.

While Sweatshop Union technically calls Canada home, they have come to


their senses and realized that America is the key to success, not that silly land to the north. And while they played more tour dates in the states than Canada in 2006, their music has also changed, turning to socially conscious lyrics that

Did You Know - The Greeting Card Association estimates that 85% of cards are purchased by women.






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Blackberry Bushes play intimate show at Brooklyn Nights

Brooklyn Nights will play host to Olympia indiegrass quartet **The Blackberry Bushes** as they head east for a short tour into Montana. This intimate show will take place on Friday, February 9th at around 9 p.m. This show is for those 21 and older only and cover is \$5 at the door.

The Blackberry Bushes are an acoustic string band of five prolific songwriters and multi-instrumentalists. Their repertoire of original americana, traditional old-time, and bluegrass music is infused with their love of jazz, indie, punk and alternative styles. The McHenry Method:

Pat McHenry gives the SiDEKiCK a look into his songwriting method

Well hello today. My name is Patrick McHenry and I'm a guitarist in the Spokane bands Smilelinespark and Paper Mache. I can say I've been playing for half of my life (I'm 21) and I can also say that I have 14 years of performance experience. Not to blow my own horn, but I get asked to teach guitar lessons just about everyday of my life. It's always the same: "Will you, like, make me get better man? There's, like, a sixer of Pabst in it for you if you wanna teach me some shit." This is of course followed by a "no" if you aren't my friend, or you don't have money and better beer (I hate Pabst). Well I thought instead of giving a public lesson about guitar, which I don't even consider myself that good at, I will share my knowledge on writing songs. At least by the end of this you will know how I

Step 1: Begin with the Melody

This can be anything. This can be one word or a whole paragraph, one note or seven. Actually it doesn't even have to be real words. As long as you've got some chords lying around, you could just make a clever combination of "La" and "Da" fit

together in a musical phrase. Sometimes I get desperate and rely on what I call the Aerosmith Method. This is where you sit in a room with a guitar or your guitar player, play the chords over and over again, and you start blurting out notes and random sounds until words come out. Eventually something catchy resolves out of all the shit you just said. (Did you know that given enough time a room full of monkeys with typewriters will recreate all of the works of Shakespeare.)

Step 2: Rhythm

Ok, so you've got a clever melody that you think might please ears. Now start thinking of what kind of beat goes with it and where you want the accents to be. Where do you want the ladies to bob their heads? Even if you don't have a drummer, Rhythm is still huge. Watch this for a great example of the Kings of Convenience on YouTube.com (http://youtube.com/watch?v=b26DfgYLBhQ)

Step 3: Dynamic

This should actually be higher than rhythm. This is the thing in your song that makes people not go to sleep on you. I heard a great story once about Dynamic.



I've probably got it way wrong but here goes: When the recording engineer who recorded Nirvana for the first time asked Cobain how he wanted to record their songs he told them (I think) "We play quiet during the verses and get really loud in the choruses." Beethoven used to lull people to sleep and then wake them up all of a sudden with an explosive overture of sound. You can also achieve this same effect with chord changes, sudden stops, screams, a bridge, etc. Dynamic!

Conclusion

By now you're probably pissed at me for telling you how to write your songs and saying "This guys has never written a chart topper or even a good drinking song! WTF?" Maybe this will help some of you out there, maybe not. There's many ways to write music out there, just find one that best fits you. Next issue will be a real life guitar lesson, promise.



The mere mention of the name "Wilco" makes me light up with a warm fuzzy feeling. Maybe it's because Wilco brings back happy memories of listening to Uncle Tupelo, but anything that involves Jeff Tweedy or Jay Farrar makes me smile. Perhaps this is why I like whiskey so much. **Glenn Kotche** is the drummer for Wilco so that make him automatically cool in my

book. Kotche will perform solo at the Empyrean on Sunday, February 18th at 7 p.m. with a little help from local singer/songwriter Sean Saugen.

A master of percussion, Kotche is known for his eclectic use of various found objects such as scrap metal and hubcaps. His exploration of rhythm and space began during his childhood in Roselle Illinois – this early-founded interest in music guided him in the University of Kentucky's highly regarded percussion program. (The SiDE-KiCK cannot independently verify the merits of U of K so please conduct further research before committing to a scholastic

program mentioned in the SiDEKiCK.)

LIVE MUSIC

Kotche joined alt-country band Wilco in 2001 and was an integral part of the gold-selling album "Yankee Hotel Foxtrot" and 2005's Grammy Award winning album "A Ghost is Born."


Besides his work as the drummer of Wilco, Kotche is also one-third of experimental rock trio Loose Fur (along with Wilco band mate Jeff

Tweedy and post-classical composer/ producer Jim

O'Rourke) and half of the experimental jazz duo On Fillmore, with bassist Darin Gray. For the Spokane show, Kotche will appear

solo performing tracks off of his three solo albums, the latest of which he released in March of 2006.

The Empyrean is located at 154 S. Madison Ave in downtown, Spokane. Basically it is one block west of the Ol' Spaghetti Factory on Monroe. This all-ages show gets started around 7 p.m. and cover is \$8 at the door. Joining

Saugen is still going strong and has continued to play solo shows around Spokane, especially at Ionic Burrito, showcasing his unassuming acoustic style. 



I make about \$16 an hour. That's \$10.85 above the current federal minimum wage, which is \$5.15 – or roughly the cost of plugging a parking meter for an hour in Washington D.C.

Just living, even though I'm not married and refuse to dispose of five-day-old Chinese leftovers (the former a possible result of the latter), on my salary can be difficult. Trying to live on \$40 a day, though, would be near impossible.

On Feb. 1, the Senate overwhelmingly voted in favor to raise the minimum wage to \$7.25 an hour – a hike of \$2.10. This increase, if passed in the House, would be done in three installments within 26 months.

Three weeks ago the House did, in fact, vote in favor of the amendment 315 to 116, setting up a possible raise in the federal minimum wage for the first time since 1996 when Congress raised it by 90 cents. However, because Democratic senators hoped to entice labor-minded Republicans with added tax breaks worth \$8.3 billion over 10 years to small businesses forced to pay higher wages, the debate will be thrown back to the House floor. There were no tax breaks included in the original House bill

that was sent to the Senate.

"It's a win-win situation for everybody," said Sen. Charles Grassley (R-IA).

The tax breaks are also likely to spark a rigorous debate within the private sector. According to the legislation, large manufacturers would be forced to help pay for the tax breaks received by small businesses. And because of these tax benefits for small businesses, corporations no longer could deduct the cost of jury verdicts or settlements in liability suits against them and their executives.

According to the Almanac of Policy Issues, "A full time minimum wage worker makes \$10,712 a year, well below the poverty line for a family of three."

The poverty threshold for a family of three in 2006, which is set annually by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, was \$16,600.

Although the federal minimum wage is set at \$5.15, states and even individual cities are allowed to set their own standard. Santa Fe, N.M. has the highest minimum wage in the country at \$9.50 an hour, even though the rest of New Mexico adheres to the federal standard. Only Kansas sets its minimum wage below the federal basement, at \$2.65 an hour.

Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA), long a proponent of increasing the federal minimum wage, is again leading the charge for the newly elected Democratic majority. Earlier this month, at a news conference with congressional, labor and business leaders, Kennedy said, "If you work 40 hours a week, 52 weeks of the year, you shouldn't have to live in poverty in the richest country of the world."

Opponents of the bill argue that teenagers and non-breadwinning workers with little experience in the workforce hold the vast majority of minimum wage jobs. And that raising the minimum wage would

likely increase unemployment because businesses would not be able to pay the heightened wages.

Minimum wage is the first test for the newly elected Democratic majority.

The party campaigned on a platform that the lower and middle classes were being swindled by corporate greed. And many within the party are upset at the concessions they were forced to give to Republicans.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev) tried to keep his base optimistic.

"The minimum wage will be increased,"

Reid said.

The House did not accept the Senate version of the bill, which passed 94 to 3, with the added amendments. The lower chamber is expected to renew debate on minimum wage, along with the added tax benefits for the companies, sometime next week.

Where the wage is set and how the final language is drafted, will carry major economic ramifications for our country. The two chambers are now likely to powwow, attempting to assuage all parties.

No matter what the scenario, a presidential veto is probably looming.

The discussion over minimum wage, at least for the 110th Congress, is starting to heat up.

Hot cocoa, American history and the Voice of God (or maybe that's just Morgan Freeman)

February, as most people are undoubtedly aware, is Black History month, a distinction that's innocuous enough at first glance, yet holds a somewhat controversial stigma about it — and justifiably so, in my opinion. Just as some hyper-politically correct Americans want to rename Columbus Day to "National Let's All Hug and Sip Hot Cocoa Day" (or whatever it is, exactly), Black History Month is met with equal adoration and skepticism.

Racists despise the "celebration" for obvious reasons, but even the average white American, who's racist and doesn't know it, seems to greet this type of symbolic distinction with ignorance. I can't tell you how many times I've heard a white dude say how stupid it is that there are things like Black History Month or Black Entertainment Television. This will undoubtedly be

followed with something along the lines of, "I mean, there's no White History Month or White Entertainment Television."

Which is true, to a point, but ultimately spurious at best. Eleven months of the year are primarily devoted to white history and a celebration of white accomplishments, both scholastically as well as in the public sphere on a day to day basis. And you could easily rename any of about 300 cable channels (USA, TBS, FOX, etc.) to White Entertainment Television, and it would make perfect sense.

The point is that dedicating one month out of the year to fostering African American history is an attempt to make up for a void in these sorts of teachings and recognitions throughout the rest of the year; it's simply not the selfish celebration that millions of white people seem to view it as. Just because white history is usually described as merely "history" doesn't mean we aren't sufficiently versed in it; the conservative white man or woman who thinks they are being persecuted against due to this sort of designation is missing the point on so many

levels, it's impossible to chronicle them all.

Yet I'm not necessarily a fan of classifications like Black History Month. Not because of the thinly-veiled racist argument of the conservative, but because of the thinly-veiled racist argument of the liberal. The politically correct atmosphere that certain leftists have fostered in America is extraordinarily troubling to me in an entirely different way. Giving the black community a month where their contributions are observed does not make up for the fact that those accomplishments go largely unrecognized for the rest of the year. Forcing people to celebate Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday does not help us move any further past racist attitudes and even remotely make up for past aggressions that started with slavery and continue to this day.

In an interview with Mike Wallace, Morgan Freeman called Black History Month "ridiculous," adding "You're going to relegate my history to a month? I don't want a Black History Month. Black history is American history." And I agree with him, up to a point. In the short term, I think it's important for every American to recognize that largely ignored African American accomplishments are part of the fabric of the country and shouldn't go ignored. But even that sentence is coded in racism, as "black history" and "white history" should not be mutually exclusive. Black History Month, and similar designations, are attempts at being at progressive, and are probably necessary steps towards a truer acceptance. But, ultimately, the best way to celebrate black history month is to stop talking about it altogether. It's naive utopian bullshit, I realize, but the hope is that we'll eventually move past this sort of racial labelling entirely and give credit where it's due, instead of where we think we should based on the month of the year or the color of the person's skin.

With a name like Paradise, Spokane's newest restaurant has a lot to live up to. Based on what I saw (and ate), they are up to the task. Paradise Restaurant, located at 226 W. Riverside Ave in the old China Best Restaurant, is probably the best restaurant that I have reviewed in the short history of this column. Not only was the meal awesome and the prices very affordable (\$10 - \$24 for dinner), Paradise has an unexplainable charm found only in family-owned establishments.

Like I mentioned before, Paradise is located in the old China Best Restaurant located next to The Spread on Riverside. Paradise makes a perfect addition to this quick growing block of downtown that, for my money, rivals the "Davenport District" for nightlife. Paradise's neighbors include The Spread (bar/live music), Prago Argentine Café (wine/coffee), Lion's Lair (lounge/pinball), and Comedy Sportz (improv theater). With the addition of Paradise, you can easily spend your entire evening in one block starting with dinner, followed by some live entertainment, and ending the night with last call.

The quick way to describe Paradise's food is Eastern European cuisine, but this is a little inadequate. The menu consists primarily of Russian Block dishes from cutlets and steaks to borsht soup, to Turkish meals like shish kebab, rack of lamb, and baklava. There is also a large selection of fondue, which is a French creation.

To start your meal I highly recommend ordering an appetizer of Paradise's garlic bread (\$2.99). I don't know what they did to the stuff but it was the best garlic bread I

have ever eaten. Both Katie and I were tempted to cancel our meals and

> just eat garlic bread the rest of the night. But after our real meals came we were very glad that we decided against that.

Upon the waiter's suggestion I ordered the Kiev's Cutlet (\$15.99) going on nothing but faith. I actually thought it was going to be beef so I was a little surprised when the Kiev's Cutlet turned

appeared to be a solid ball of chicken.

Katie Says:

Paradise was a sumptuously wonderful place to dine. Not only was the interior decadent, but so was the food. I tried the Plov, which was apparently derived in the time of Alexander the Great's tour to conquer the world. It was made for Alexander and his troops while they were crossing Uzbekistan by a local chef. The Plov is a rice, beef, and vegetable dish that melted in my mouth. The rice, beef, and vegetables had all been slow cooked together and everything was exceptionally tender and infused with flavor.

After carefully devouring the whole thing I can truthfully claim that the Kiev's Cutlet makes Chicken Cordon Bleu look like McDonald's Chicken McNuggets. The combinations of olives and cheese with the very tender chicken made for a taste that kept its assertiveness with every fork-full - every subsequent bite had just as much flavor as the first.

Since I ate all of my vegetables, Katie let me order dessert... Baklava! For anyone who has never tasted Baklava (\$3.99), it is a sweet pastry made of chopped nuts, usually walnuts or pistachios, layered with phyllo pastry, and sweetened with sugar or honey syrup between each layer. And it's probably the closest you will ever come to Ambrosia.

With awesome food and an intimate atmosphere, Paradise has absolutely everything needed to become a dining mainstay. Their food is distinctly different that everywhere else in town and at a price point that won't break your piggy bank. I am just a little sad that in 3 months I will have a hard time finding a seat on a weekend night. Fortunately for me, reservation are accepted.

Maybe love doesn't literally make the world rotate, but a little love for your planet can go a long way toward guaranteeing its future. Al Gore bravely and brilliantly presented in "An Inconvenient Truth" science we cannot ignore about the warming of our planet. The United States remains the largest world and per capita contributor of carbon dioxide (CO2) to our atmosphere. Major changes must be made in our government to reduce our emissions, in the true spirit of democracy, each of us can make a significant personal contribution.

I challenge you, this Valentine's Day, to show everyone your love by doing something to prolong a habitable environment on earth. Bring the flowers and wine, but do more this year for yourself and everyone else you would like to see live to a ripe, old age.

In honor of your love for life, take a couple of minutes February 14th, alone, or with a sweetie, and take one of these small steps, suggested by Al Gore at www. climatecrisis.net, toward decreasing your CO2 output. In the spirit of the holiday, I've followed each earth-saving tip with a romantic twist. Let's use love to keep the world going 'round with a habitat humans can live in.

Replace incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent bulbs in all rooms of your house.

CFLs not only use 60% less energy than a regular bulb, but they last up to ten times as long as normal bulbs. This simple switch will save about 300 pounds of carbon dioxide a year. If every family in the U.S. made the switch, we'd reduce carbon dioxide by more than 90 billion pounds! You can purchase CFLs at local grocery stores and box stores.

Love tip: Replace light bulbs in sexy clothes or no clothes at all. The high reach makes for a nice a view.

Move your thermostat down 2° in winter (and up 2° in summer)

Almost half of the energy we use in our homes goes to heating and cooling. You could save about 2,000 pounds of carbon dioxide a year with this simple adjustment.

Love tip: Though you're unlikely to notice the slight drop in temperature, this is a perfect excuse to warm each other up (in whatever way you see fit).

Install a low flow showerhead

It takes a lot of energy to heat water. You can use less hot water by installing a low flow showerhead (350 pounds of carbon dioxide saved per year) and washing your clothes in cold or warm water (500 pounds saved per year) instead of hot.

Love tip: Share your shower, but make it quick. Take the business back to the bedroom instead of letting the water run.

Turn off and unplug electronic devices you're not using

Simply turning off your television, DVD player, stereo, and computer when you're not using them will save you thousands of pounds of carbon dioxide a year.



Love tip: Turn it all off and enjoy each other completely. Read to each other. Play twister au naturale.


Clean or replace filters on your furnace and air conditioner

Cleaning a dirty air filter can save 350 pounds of carbon dioxide a year.

Love tip: This begs for a little role-playing. Who is that attractive stranger come to fix the furnace? I suggest suspenders with no shirt (for either gender).

Plant a tree

A single tree will absorb one ton of carbon dioxide over its lifetime.



Love tip: This might be limited depending on your climate, but if you can't do it yet, plan it out, including the hammock you'll hang from it as it grows and what fun one might have with a hammock. A little fantasy always gets things going.

Buy fresh food instead of frozen,

The average meal in the United States travels 1,200 miles from the farm to your plate. Buying locally will save fuel and keep money in your community. Frozen food uses 10 times more energy to produce. Local farmers reduce the amount of energy required to grow and transport the food to you by one fifth. Organic soils capture and store carbon dioxide at much higher levels than soils from conventional farms. If we grew all of our corn and soybeans organically, we'd remove 580 billion pounds of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere!

Love tip: Cook a meal together. There's something rustically romantic about preparing food. Feed each other and see if you make it through the whole meal. Don't forget strawberries, chocolate, and whipped cream for dessert.

Something new:

I rented The Last Kiss (2006) because I liked what I'd heard of the soundtrack and, since Zach Braff seems to have been crowned the foremost authority on independent rock, I wanted to hear if there were any other bands or songs worth checking out. Sadly, the soundtrack is the best thing going here, and it's really not all that great. Like Garden State (2004), this is a mediocre story that's trying way too

hard to make people think it's better than it is.

Something solid:

People generally seem to regard Woody Allen as either the greatest American director of all time or an esoteric, whiny, neurotic blowhard. Yet I would think that Annie Hall (1977), largely hailed as his greatest film, bridges this gap, as it's relatively mainstream in its execution, extraordinarily witty and entertaining in its delivery, and peppered with memorable scenes and a generally likeable story from beginning to end. Easily the best film on this list, in my opinion.

Something blue:

There are many, so let's go quickly: The English Patient (1996) is melodramatic, glitzy crap that's about six hours too long, Pretty Woman has got to be one of the most shoddily made and overrated films in history, The Story of Us (1999) is probably the worst Bruce Willis flick ever (and that's saying something; never watch a movie he's in unless he gets to dropkick somebody), Chasing Amy (1997) is a perfect example of why Kevin Smith is the least talented famous person this side of Paris Hilton, You've Got Mail (1998) is one of Meg Ryan's many offerings that most heterosexual guys are going to find difficult to stomache and, while we're at it, it's probably best just to stay away from anything involving Hugh Grant.

I've often found myself on the outside

looking in as far as a lot of recent, supposedly great films are concerned. I thought Babel was terrible, Chicago was overrated, and Return of the King was far and away the worst Lord of the Rings installment. That's not meant to make me sound like I'm a cultural elitist or that I'm a particularly adept film critic or anything like that, just that, for better or worst, I'm not sure exactly what people are extracting from these films that make them so appealling.

This general trend continued recently when I went to Pan's Labyrinth, a Spanish language offering from Guillermo del Toro, who had the bad sense to direct not only Hellboy, but is linked to its sequel, as well. Pan's Labyrinth certainly isn't as bad as a movie like Hellboy II has to be (I mean, seriously); I guess I'm just not sure what everybody sees in it.


Maybe the major pull here is that it looks pretty, which is

absolutely the case, albeit it in a dark and depressing way. The cinematic elements all come together nicely - especially the aforementioned cinematography – as well as the acting, the latter of which is carried by 11 year-old Ivana Baquero who's incredibly comfortable in the lead role. The story, however, is simply an escapist fantasy where you can easily lose yourself in the world of the film, but don't really take anything away from the experience. That strikes me as a decent way to kill a couple hours, to

be sure, but that doesn't qualify it as a cinematic triumph, in my opinion.

By the way, the fact that this is an escapist fantasy centered around a child's imagination might make it a fairy tale, but it's undeniably a fairy tale for adults. Despite

> being half fantasy, Pan's Labyrinth deserves its R rating. At turns gruesome and brutal, this is also half a war movie and there wasn't a single adult in the screening I saw who didn't at least shift in their seat at some point. Apparently the film is even banned in Malaysia for "excessive



violent scenes" and, though that seems a bit much, it's really not all that far-fetched.

Ultimately, the crux of the movie isn't much to lean on. Pan's Labyrinth is, in all reality, a simple religious film at heart. Like the grey havens in the Lord of the Rings as a thinly veiled heaven analogy, so too is the fantasy world created by our protagonist Ofelia. In the end, that makes it little more than a straightforward escapist story with little more to offer than, hey, we may be screwed now but heaven's going to kick

Not that there's really anything wrong with that, I suppose – after all, getting bogged down in complexity is going to hinder a film as much as succumbing to simplicity – again it's just that I don't see what everyone's raving about. That said, if you go into Pan's Labyrinth without expecting too much, this will surely prove an enjoyable experience. Though I don't totally agree with the message, I can still appreciate the competency with which it was pulled off. 🔻




Assassins presents additional musical option

Spokane Speed Dating offers inexpensive alternative to bar scene

Speed Dating has been a presence in Spokane for a little over four years now and already seven marriages have spawned directly from these alternative dating events, with an eighth engagement announced shortly before Christmas. At least. Cathy Prows, the founder and coordinator for these events, points out that those are only the ones she knows about and there very well could be several more that she's unaware of.

"It's definitely rewarding when people connect and meet the love of their life," Prows adds, obviously excited, "That's the whole idea."

Cathy founded Spokane Christian Singles in the summer of 2000 as a fun, inviting atmosphere for 20 and 30 yearolds. The group holds weekly events such as bowling, dancing, heading to comedy clubs and other fun alternatives to hitting the bars and getting hammered. She added the Speed Dating events a couple of years later as an extension of this atmosphere into the world of dating. Currently, Speed Dating events are bi-monthly with an event geared towards a slightly younger crowd (45 and below) held every other Saturday, along with a Speed Dating geared for an older crowd held either the night before of the afternoon following. Though founded as a group for Christians, Cathy asserts that it's simply an inclusive and welcoming event for people looking to meet decent, responsible people.

"We don't turn people away if they can't prove they're a Christian or anything like that," Cathy says. "We don't inquire about their faith at the door."

Speed Dating sessions are set up so that participants are provided a set of questions to ask the potential suitor in three minute intervals. Women interrogate the men first,

as the guys rotate around the room until everyone has spent a few minutes with everyone else of the opposite sex. After a little break, the women make the rounds this time, as the men take their turns asking questions. Everyone wears a number instead of a name tag and, at the end of the interview process, the men and women submit numbers corresponding to the singles they're interested in. If two people have selected each other, then that's a match.

Cathy started this program after seeing a television feature highlighting similar ideas implemented in other towns, and thought it would be a successful and helpful addition to the Spokane scene.

"I wanted to provide a fun, safe, inexpensive and effective method in finding the perfect match for other singles," she explains, citing that this is an "extremely inexpensive alternative" to bar-hopping or taking your chances on the internet. Cost is \$10 for your first Speed Dating attendance, and \$7 thereafter.

The next bi-weekly Speed Dating events are coming up in time for you to snag a date by Valentine's Day. On Friday, February 9th, singles 20-49 are invited to try their luck, while Saturday is reserved for anyone under 45. St. Valentine's Day Massacre


While the famous St. Valentine's Day Massacre has really nothing to do with the holiday itself besides having the distinction of falling on the morning of Feb. 14th, we're still going to write about it, mostly because gangsters have fun nicknames. On Feb. 14, 1929, five members of Al "Scarface" Capone's gang brutally gunned down seven members of his north side Chicago rival's posse, led by George "Bugs" Moran. The plan was devised by one of



Capone's chief henchman, Jack "Machine Gun" McGurn, to rid Chicago of Moran's presence. And it did, to an extent, but also ultimately brought Capone under federal scrutiny, culminating with his imprisonment on tax evasion charges in 1931. Probably the most "inspirational" massacre of all time (as horrible as that sounds), the event inspired a James Taylor song, a 50 Cent album, and several film and pop culture parodies. If this is all a bit gruesome for you, you can pretend that "St. Valentine's Day Massacre" refers to one of two sporting events named in its honor – a 1999 WWF pay-per-view event or the savage beating Jake Lamotta took at the hands of Sugar Ray Robinson in 1951. 
reasons that we can't possibly phathom, the soundtrack is largely provided by Depeche Mode (!)
