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

John Craigie returns to Caterina for concert with The Shook Twins

For the most recent Pick of the Issue – our opinion of the best local, live event over the next couple of weeks – we're selecting the upcoming Caterina show with **John Craigie**, **The Shook Twins** and **Marshall McLean** on Saturday, May 12th. Combining a fantastic frequent folk visitor in John Craigie with the excellent Sandpoint duo of The Shook Twins, this is sure to be another stellar night in the routinely excellent musical housing of Caterina.

John Craigie, a traveling singer/songwriter loosely based out of San Francisco is, without a doubt, worth the scant

San Francisco is, without a doubt, worth the scant \$5 cover on his own. Last time he came through town we described him as "Woody Guthrie meets Stephen Stills" but after seeing his set, a more apt comparison would be to say he's as entertaining as Arlo Guthrie, as engaging as Nick Drake and as good as Cat Stevens.

To be honest, we found his 2005 release *Daddy*Longlegs somewhat underwhelming and the decision to check out his most recent Spokane performance – another Caterina affair back in January – was based on the entire evening's collection of musicians (which, if memory serves us, included the lovely Melody Moore and the always impressive Mark Ward). Having little prior interaction with Craigie's music, he was probably the musician we were least excited to see before getting to the venue.

Not anymore.

Wielding nothing more than his guitar and brandishing the set with stories, self-effacing humor and catchy, conversational tracks, Craigie is a musician that must be seen live. Making the Inland Northwest rounds once again, it's almost certain that there will be



a number of converts reappearing after having caught one of his previous Spokane performances (like us, for example).

While we didn't feel like *Daddy Longlegs* accurately captured his highly approachable music as it's experienced in person, it's worth noting that John's latest album – the recently released *Picnic on the 405* – is a much more adept effort. Our initial reaction to Craigie's studio efforts was that they were over-produced and his songs simply work better with just the guitar, a bit of an echo, and the occasional

harmonica. While, that's still partially true, *Picnic at the* 405 shows that he's a skilled enough musician to be able to craft an album with a scattered array of instruments – drums, violins, etc. – and still be engaging. Basically, what we're saying is that it's a worthy effort that still falls a distant second to seeing him on stage. Luckily

falls a distant second to seeing him on stage. Luckily, there's an easy remedy, since John's swinging through Spokane for a May $12^{\rm th}$ appearance.

After bloviating at length about Craigie, there's not much room left to talk about the Shook Twins – who are actually the headliners – but any regular reader of this publication is likely to have stumbled across past mentions pretty much anytime they come to town. They're currently on a short list as part of our next Pick of the Issue, as well, so this won't be the last time you hear us praising their infectious folk pop sound. Obviously, we're big on this band.

Marshall McLean completes the singer/songwriter sandwich with a set that will start things off at about 8 p.m. at Caterina Winery, 905 N. Washington. Cover is \$5 for an all ages audience. For more information, log onto www.spokanesidekick.com.

We suspect that many of our readers will fall into more than one category, and that's OK. We're not pigeonholing you into a particular musical taste, we're merely providing a guide to point you in the direction of whatever show you might feel like going to on a given night.



The Cowboy

Likes his riffs tight and his jeans even tighter. Can be spotted at classic rock shows and country line dance bars. Has a deep and abiding respect for Lynyrd Skynyrd and Toby Keith, and is the proud owner of at least one forearm tattoo, most likely involving the American flag.

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
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About our theme:

The result of a torrid love affair between a West Virginia turd farmer and the heiress to the Lucky Strike cigarette fortune, Stephen was born on May 13, 1965 in a small town in western South Carolina. When he was only two years old - already possessing a rudimentary knowledge of democratic theory and more than a formidable skill at hair styling and spectacle modeling – Stephen's parents were forced to leave South Carolina in the middle of the night when a band of moonshine racketeers, apparently

cottonwood tree to retreat from the ensuing inferno. Unable to find their son, Stephen's parents had no choice but to flee North across the Mason-Dixon line while the young Colbert

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Bing Crosby concert celebrates local crooning legends

On Saturday, May 10, the Spokane Jazz Orchestra and multi-talented local jazz musician Horace Alexander Young will pay tribute to two of the most prominent pioneers of jazz – Nat King Cole and Frank Sinatra. Attendees will be treated to renditions of Sinatra and Cole favorites such as Luck be a Lady Tonight, The Best Is yet

To Come, Fly Me To the Moon, My Way, L-O-V-E, Mona Lisa, and Route 66.

Sinatra, a well-known actor and crooner, was universally recognized as the voice of the golden age of swing. Cole, a singer,

songwriter, and musician, was the first African-American to have his own television show, *The Nat King Cole Show*, which debuted in 1956.

Young graduated from Washington State University in 1983 and has made himself a name in not only the local jazz scene, but also on the world stage, having performed both the jazz flute and saxophone, as well as singing, across 17 countries on five continents. Young has also performed with famous musicians like B.B. Kings, The Four Tops, The Temptations, and Toots Theilemens, among many others.

Young is not only a talented jazz musician and singer, but also a published author, with his instructional "Improvis-



ing Jazz Flute" being bought by more than 8,000 inspiring flautists. Young also contributed regularly for GIG magazine, a now defunct arts and entertainment magazine.


Currently an assistant professor of music at WSU, Young regularly performs locally as well as acting as composer-pianist

Abdullah Ibrahim's musical directory and principal arranger.

The Spokane Jazz Orchestra continues a 32nd season as the oldest, continually performing, professional community jazz orchestra in the nation. Directed by Dr. Dan Keberle, an experienced jazz performer, director and

educator, the show will be the second this year for the Orchestra, which has had past guest artists ranging from Mel Torme and Chuck Mangione to the Drifters and the Platters in its illustrious career.

This salute to songs made famous by a pair of two true jazz legends will begin at 8 p.m. at the recently named Bing Crosby Theater, 901 W. Sprague in downtown Spokane. Tickets cost between \$26.50 and \$31.50 and are available through www. ticketswest.com, 1-800-325-SEAT or through any of the TicketsWest vendors around town (see center calendar spread). formative years, however, Stephen was able to quickly develop a keen sense of sight where he could spot a centipede at a half mile away. However, like the birds of prey intrusting Stephen in their care, his hunting was based on movement and not color. To this day, Stephen has retained an unusual form of colorblindness, where he is unable, even, to see race (and sometimes gets confused with gender).

will appear at the Blue Spark on May 10th, accompanied by the Danny McCollim Group. The evening will also serve as a fundraiser for "Dollars for Darfur," a national effort by high school students to stop the ongoing genocide in the Darfur region of the Sudan.

"High school students from across America have been raising funds for humanitarian work and to stop this craziness," Julia said. "And a number of prominent artists have been help-

ing out, so I thought this performance should try to assist ... We're using Facebook and MySpace to spread the word among our peers and show the suffering people of Darfur that we care."

Julia is a local jazz singer who has shown amazing maturity and garnered significant recognition in the region for her raw talent and admirable dedication to singing jazz standards despite her not yet having graduated high school.

"I started out listening to Billie Holiday when I was about four years old. Then I discovered Ella, Dinah Washington, Blossom Dearie and dozens of other great female jazz vocalists. The more I listened, the more I wanted to learn the songs, and

learn how to improvise and scat. Jazz is just such an amazing All-American art form. I feel like I'm singing history," she added.

In addition to the Blue Spark benefit performance on the 10th, Julia will also be giving a concert at ella's Supper Club on May 29th that she's dedicating to lost local jazz treasure Mildred Bailey, which

> will also act as a release for her first album "Julia Keefe: Live at ella's," a collection of eight songs recorded at the venue a few months back with the Danny McCollim Group.

Although additional performances in Spokane are still being discussed, Julia

intends to head for Seattle for the month of June to study vocal technique with Greta Matassa, a leading performer on the Seattle jazz scene. Julia hopes to then perform at Tula's, one of Seattle's top jazz clubs late in the month of June, before eventually heading to the Catholic University of America School of Music in Washington DC in the fall, studying musical theater.





A discussion with genre-crossing high school rockers Isenheart

The 16-year-old trio consisting of Bryan Coats, Macarthur "Mack" Rife, and Garret Zanol is exactly the kind of band needed in Spokane to blend alternative rock, folk and emo together (and without being offended by the latter). These three local Spokane sounds have become known to appear as condescending when stood alone, but when mixed altogether? Simply blissful.

J: So, what do you think of being in Isenheart so far?

BRYAN COATS: It's nice being in this as opposed to other bands because everyone does not have opposed thoughts

about what they want to do with music. For us, we all know what we want to accomplish, and that makes it a lot easier.

MACK RIFE: We're all pretty open to each other about everything that's going on.

B: If we don't like something that's being played, we'll tell each other as opposed to just hating what we play.

J: [to Mack] stylistically, how do you approach your guitar parts?

M: I just really don't like it when my parts sound the same. If I write one song and I write another that either sounds like that one or something I've heard, I usually get angry. I just throw it out the window completely.

J: [to Bryan] Drumming question, what pattern do you typically go off on to get it going?

B: It varies with song. Some of our songs start just very mellow and then some just break right in, so it varies. I try to keep my drumming different 'cause I don't like having the same.


M: We usually yell at each other and say, "Hey! That sounds alike! You can't do that!"

B: Yeah, he's a big fan of the word "generic."

M: Yeah, each song as a feeling.

J: So, what do you like to do chill out after a night performing?

B: Usually after practice or a per-



formance, we just hang out, watch The Office.

M: [laugh] During practices!

B: During practices, after. We like to go to [Mack]'s house, and he has a shop that we practice in, and we write a lot in there. We get a lot done usually. If you practice too much, you get sick of it.

M: I wouldn't say bored so much as just easily distracted. When they found out I had the trampoline that was a good day.

B: We try to stay focused.

Stephen and his rejuvenated parents briefly relocated to Pittsburgh, but the arrangements were short-lived, as they were again driven north. 



While most viewed The Professor - a homeless "resident" of Central Park - as an obviously insane and deeply troubled man, Stephen saw the true genius behind the bearded, nearly toothless drunkard. Sure, The Professor was fond of having heated discussions with himself about the correct way to remove dog feces from a public sidewalk, but given the right ingredients he could sure mix a mean martini. During their nightly walks through Central Park, The Professor would teach his young student about all the finer points of drinking your own urine and what varieties of mold are acceptable to scrape off a slice of bread without considering the whole loaf wasted. Unfortunately, during one of these pleasant strolls, an





Fake news, real problems and an introduction to The Archie Bunker Effect

Dear whomever,

There are a seemingly growing number of people who are fond of citing that "fake" news outlets like The Daily Show and Colbert Report are viable forums to get social and political information, akin to watching a nightly news broadcast that doesn't involve masturbation jokes and frequent outbursts of profanity. And, for the most part, I agree with these people. I just happen to think they're right for the wrong reasons.

The general argument seems to be that just because the clips are sandwiched between a joke about Richard Gere and a reference to Gilligan's Island, you still get the same basic content that one is likely to find on a legitimate news broadcast. And, up to a point, that's true. The Daily Show's news segments are generally aligned to whatever lead story the major nightly news outlets and cable news stations are likely to carry. However, whereas proper news present a non-stop format of story after story (even if they are often repetitious or vacuous as all get out), The Daily Show only tiptoes into the waters.

By the time you throw in a bunch of satire, a comedy segment where one of the reporters makes an ass out of someone and an interview with a no-name author or B-list celebrity, it's like watching the cliff notes of what major news provides (or, at the very least, should provide). Of course the catch is that it's entertaining as hell and transforms the news from borderline intolerable to genuinely hilarious.

Yet despite – or perhaps because of – all this, I still think fake news is every bit as valuable as real news – not because it supplies

the same content, but because it transcends that content in a very real way. The value of The Daily Show, in my opinion, is that they cut through the bullshit with not only satire, but at least an attempt at honesty. Exposing the inner-workings of amorphous bodies like the government or mass media as a veritable theatre of the absurd, The Daily Show is engaging in a way that most news formats are stagnant, pacifying and moderately watchable at best (obviously, I'm not a big fan of CNN, Fox News and the like).

The Colbert Report is a slightly different situation, since the attempt is not one of honesty but deception. While Jon Stewart and company are there to call out public figures in their hypocrisy, deceitfulness and borderline insanity, The Colbert Report is there to embrace them. Stephen Colbert, the semi-fictional anchor of The Colbert Report, isn't that far-removed from Bill O'Reilly, only he's got a sense of humor and, to my knowledge, has never sexually harassed a call girl. The obvious result shows that fringe hosts like O'Reilly and Rush Limbaugh are somewhere between ridiculous and batshit crazy in their unwavering convictions. The means employed by The Daily Show and The Colbert Report are actually quite different, but the results are roughly the same.

My only fear is that Colbert presenting himself in the manner he does will breed what you might call The Archie Bunker Effect. When Norman Lear created *All in the Family* in the late 70s, the idea was that he would surround a crazy, loud-mouthed Archie Bunker with a cast of characters that were slightly more intelligent, significantly more stable and infinitely more progressive. The show was supposed to be entertainment, yes, but Lear also wanted it to make Bunker look like a fool and expose the fallacies of certain

conservative arguments.

The only problem is that a staggering number of viewers tuned in because they agreed with Bunker's bigoted, grumpy ramblings and couldn't find their point of view legitimized anywhere else on television. They didn't see Bunker as a crackpot; they saw him as a valid voice of the silent majority.

The same thing is hypothetical possible, to a certain degree, with The Colbert Report.

Inventing a hyper-patriotic, incomprehen-

sibly faithful, strictly fundamentalist persona, Colbert has to project that facade with some air of believability or the show wouldn't work. Fortunately, he's self-effacing enough not to achieve the believability that Carroll O'Connor attained in the role of Archie Bunker and – if the lines garnering the most audience applauses are any indication – the political ideals of his viewers are more aligned with Al Franken than Ann Coulter. It'll be interesting to continue watching whether this effect has any merit whatsoever or if the satire is thinly-veiled enough to draw in only viewers who want to see the other side being ridiculed.

Really, though, that mild concern is little more than a side note. The slight harm that these shows could bring about is far outweighed by their value as operating outside of the usual disingenuous and placating nature of the vast majority of American newscasts.

It's also worth mentioning that both shows routinely engage their guests and audiences in complex issues like race and poverty that are usually breezed over in favor of partisan bickery on the more "serious" alternatives.


In the end, The Daily Show and Colbert Report find different ways to

> address the problem of mainstream media reporting but both are comparably effective in doing so. Oh yeah; and they're both

hilarious.
Purists might say that

PBS or the BBC or whatever is the "best" way to ingest televised news, but I think what all this proves is that this block of programming on Comedy Central is the best hour of television since Arrested Development went off the air. Pretty much anything that challenges the status quo in a marginally respectful and laugh-out-loud funny way will inevitably open up the dialogue to some degree. And that can only be seen as a good thing.

the trailer made it look like a moderately intelligent and potentially entertaining popcorn flick dripping with implications

of taking reality television to its radical extreme. Which, for over an hour, is quite nearly what you get.

And everything turns to shit.


Centering a movie around 10 death row prisoners (sorry, "capital punishment casualties") battling to death on an island for a chance at freedom is enticing to me because it's shrouded in questions of televised violence and the people who create and

watch the stuff. It doesn't hurt that, in the process, you get a vicarious thrill watching Stone Cold Steve Austin browbeat a sadistic little Japanese dude with a bowie knife and a number of other similar scenarios. All an action film has to do to work, for me, is be moderately entertaining and try not to do or say anything stupid which, apparently, is a lot harder than it sounds. Unfortunately, The Condemned tries to make a point and, though that's what I wanted going in, I really wish that wasn't the case now.

For the majority of the movie, you go along with it and enjoy the sufficient level of fistfights and acceptable ratio of explosions per convict, accompanied by coy one-liners and the mild reality television interrogation that's ubiquitous but never overwhelming. All in all, the majority of the film could have been handled a little better - more crowd shots from the supposed adoring audience, less melodrama, etc. - but it's got a lot of roundhouse kicks, a few laughs and a little substance underneath which, considering the main star is most notable for hitting dudes over the head with a collapsible table while wearing a speedo, is just about the best case scenario.

And then everything turns on a dime and the last half hour is disastrous at best.

Following a didactic dig at the audience for getting their rocks off at violent entertainment – which seems a bit hypocritical and useless, to be kind – the movie takes a turn for the absolute worst. Without giving away too much, suffice it to say that pretty much everybody turns into a psychopath and any sort of commentary morphs from over-the-top into flat-out infuriating. The ending also happens to be exceptionally cheesy and, well, just plain awful on nearly every level.





Bewitched a surprisingly tolerable comedy

I rented **Bewitched** for the sole reason that it appears to be the only evidence that Stephen Colbert has played anyone beyond himself (or semi-fictional delineation). There was a reason I'd avoided Bewitched since its 2005 release; namely because it looked terrible. And though it might not sound like a particularly profound statement to make; shockingly, Bewitched doesn't suck.

The real bright spot here is that it's full of really great people. Michael Caine is pretty much fantastic in everything he's ever been in, Will Ferrell is naturally hilarious, Stephen Colbert is funny even when he isn't

doing anything and I'm in love with Nicole Kidman. Not only is she a great actress (Bewitched not really being the best example of that, but that's besides the point), she also manages the almost impossible task of being adorable and yet sophisticatedly sexy. And she has a Kiwi accent. I need to stop.

More to the point, this is a surprisingly

funny movie for a somewhat contrived, undeniably predictable high concept vehicle. The writing is excellent (at least through the first hour) and the repeated digs that are taken at the egomaniacal actors puts it on par with *Team America: World Police* in the film's hilarious disdain for acting as a legitimate profession.

A common mistake that seems to be made with studio comedies is that the filmmakers don't seem to have much of a sense of humor, when it comes right down to it. Sure, they'll throw in joke after joke, but it's rare to find writers and directors who are able to make fun of themselves in the process without reverting simply to the cliché or contrived. That's not

to say that Bewitched is wholly

unique or anything like that

– it certainly dips into the sappy, artificial romantic comedy over the last half hour that I expected throughout – but there

was enough working in the movie's favor prior to a formulaic ending to not derail it completely.

Perhaps most importantly, for me,

Bewitched is the last straw that anything Will Ferrell is in is going to be worth seeing. Even the worst Saturday Night Live skits that he was a part of were watchable simply because he was in them. Hell, Elf was funny, and that wouldn't be something you could say if anyone else was cast in the lead role. That realization might not seem particularly worthwhile, but it's one in a number of surprising factors that make Bewitched a fairly rewarding experience. Nobody's going to claim it's a great movie – or even a great comedy, for that matter. But it's mildly engaging and often very, very funny, which at least makes it worth checking out.



Two unique events combining circus showmanship, visual spectacle and athletic prowess are making their way through Spokane over the next couple of weeks with Cirque de Soleil Presents Delirium performing a pair of shows at the Spokane Arena over May 16th and 17th and **Cirque** Dreams: Jungle Fantasy continuing its two-week engagement at Northern Quest Casino that got underway on May 2nd.

Delirium is a combination of dance, music, theatre and multimedia that aims for audience introspection and technical mastery of the highest magnitude. For the latter, the stage alone is enough to do the job: a 130-foot, two-sided behemoth that literally immerses the audience in the performance. The multimedia aspects, meanwhile, are roughly equivalent to four IMAX screens – a total of 540 feet of projections.

Inhabiting the stage are 44 artists - musicians, singers, dancers and a few "main characters" - who provide chiefly auditory entertainment that's brought over from their respective homelands - with 20 countries represented in all. Meanwhile, a slew of acrobats are constantly balancing and almost literally flying through the air, adding up to an explosion of artistic release in a virtual sensory overload.

Tickets are set at a wide range, starting at \$39.50 and going up to \$99.50, available through www.ticketswest.com and the other outlets listed at the end of this article. Delirium gets underway at 8 p.m. both evenings (Wednesday, May 16th and Thursday, May 17th) at The Arena, 720 W. Mallon.

Cirque Dreams: Jungle Fantasy is essentially the same thing on a smaller (and cheaper) scale. While not as overwhelming or impressive in its magnitude, the idea is similar in that it's a fusion of theatre, music, dance, costumes and creativity.

In Jungle Fantasy, performers who blur the line between entertainment and athletics contort and generally abuse their bodies for your amusement in front of a traditional jungle canopy. In the process, clowns, acrobats, singers, jugglers, balancing artists and other specialty acts weave in and out - an impressively choreographed visual feast in the Casino's Pend Oreille Pavillion.

Jungle Fantasy runs for two weeks with nightly showings and twice-weekly matinees. Showtimes are 7 p.m. on weeknights (as well as Sundays) and 8:30 on Friday and Saturday evenings. There will also be 2 p.m. matinees on Sundays and Thursdays, with the play running through its Tuesday, May 15th performance. Tickets are available on a sliding scale from \$20 to \$40, depending on age and performance time. Handful of showings remain for final Ignite play

Ignite Community Theatre is closing out the 2006-2007 season of plays with a production of Phillip King's **See How They Run**. The play opened in late April, but there are still a few more opportunities to take in the comedy at the beautiful

theatrical space that Ignite has recently secured as their own – the Cajun Room of the Riverwalk Building near the corner of Trent and Hamilton. See



How They Run closes out its run on Saturday, May 12th.

The play, conceived by King in 1945, is a farce of mistaken identities set in a mansion tucked away in an absurd-sounding British town. Galloping in and out of the four doors of the English vicarage are an American actor and actress (he is now stationed with the air force in England and she's the vicar's wife), a cockney maid who has seen too many American movies, another old maid who "touches alcohol for the first time," four men in clergy outfits (presenting the problem of which is which, a genuine concern considering one of them is actually an escaped prisoner), and a sedate Bishop aghast at all these goings on and trumped up tales they're feeding him. The result is a comedy of errors in about 16 quarters time - non-stop wouldn't go quite far enough to describe the frenetic pace.

Tickets are \$12 for adults and \$10 for students, seniors and military personnel. Showtimes are 8 p.m. on Thursday through Saturday, with Sunday matinees at 2. 
The almost incalculably popular rock opera **Rent** will give a fitting farewell to the Best of Broadway series for the next few months, with a pair of performances at the INB Performing Arts Center on Monday, May 14^{th} and Tuesday, May 15^{th} .

Taking place under the shroud of the AIDS epidemic in New York's East Village, Rent follows a cast of impoverished musicians and artists struggling to find their voices, surviving and creating in a harsh, changing world.

Rent draws heavily off of Giacomo Puccini's similarly well-liked Italian Opera *La Boheme*. Updated to reflect late 20th century New York instead of 1880s Paris, tuberculosis is replaced by AIDS, and countless similar substitutions are made. The songs, meanwhile, maintain many of the same elements, despite the fact that La Boheme contains a severe lack of electric guitar.

People love Rent to an almost fanatical degree. It's unlikely that you'll encounter someone who's only seen the play once – it seems to be either countless times or not at all. That's not to mention, also, that the play won pretty much every major theatrical honor in 1996, including a Pulitzer and multiple Tonys.

After the death of The Professor and his subsequent graduation from high school, Stephen set out to see more of the world. As a man who was used to understanding everything – even the ending to 2001: A Space Odyssey – he became confused at how such a country as great as the United States could be met with disdain by much of the outside world. With a backpack full of American flags and top grade hashish, Stephen set out for Nicaragua to help spread the joy of the American way. Shortly after arriving in Managua, however, a slight mispronunciation in his usually adept Spanish turned an innocent attempt at hailing a cab

into an accidental insulting of at least three and as many as five army officers standing nearby. It's unclear exactly what was said, but it's almost certain that the insult involved the words "castration," "goat," and "douchebaggery." Predictably, Stephen killed somewhere between 8 and 33 local military personnel – depending on which eyewitness account you listen to - and there is now a price on his head in Nicaragua roughly equal to the annual revenue of every country in Central America that you can't identify by name. Many say that the event is indirectly responsible for the rebel uprising and ensuing Iran-Contra scandal that occurred a few years later.

Selflessly bolting Nicaragua instead of straining U.S. foreign relations to a further degree, Stephen spent the rest of the summer wandering around Europe. A full grown and by all accounts handsome man, Stephen was hoping to sample some of that sweet European tail he'd heard so much about. Unfortunately for him, the incredible stench of freedom oozing from his every pour repulsed the many French, Italian and English women who would have otherwise been immediately drawn to Colbert, and he left the continent sexually unsatisfied. save for a drunken, late night episode with an Icelandic fishing boat captain name Jøn who still visits Stephen in his dreams on particularly lonely nights, usually dressed in cutoff denim shorts and singing showtunes. All in all, Stephen considered the trip a



failure and only strengthened his conviction that the United States of America is the greatest country in the history of the world. He is still heard uttering warnings to anyone expressing a wish to travel abroad, saying that even he "didn't get any action all summer"



Time Bomb celebrates birthday with First Friday art show



Time Bomb Collectibles, located at 711 N. Monroe Street just across the bridge from downtown, is celebrating its one year anniversary with an art show on Friday, May 4th as part of the larger First Friday celebration. The show starts at 5 p.m. and will feature the art of Cristie Dunavan, Jeff Allison, Chris Spriggs (aka Rage), Eric Johnson, and Jim Koch. Everyone is invited to this free event.

One of the highlights of this show is the digital-on-canvas works of emerging artist Christie Dunavan. Her "digital paintings" were previously on display at Prago Argentine Cafe but have made the jump across town to the walls of Time Bomb. The dark yet luminous portraits of zombies, monsters, star-

lets, and little girls are eye catching at first glace because of their vibrant pallets and near-photographic detail, but it is the darkness that lies beneath each image that really captures your attention. The details of each drawing are littered with iconographic symbols of horror and goth that are hardly noticeable at a glance but "come to life" as you study every detail of the image.

Dunavan creates her work by fusing classic and modern techniques that ultimately end with a super hi-res PhotoShop file printed upon canvas. An initial sketch is scanned into a computer and painstakingly finished with a digital paintbrush with a technique that is utterly amazing. 

Upon returning to the U.S, Colbert mastered what little theology he hadn't previously comprehended with a four-year tenure at Bob Jones University, and is now considered one of the foremost authorities on the rapture. Turning to journalism in order to allow his uniquely brilliant comprehension of American policy and Christian ethics to the highest possible audience, Stephen spent several years as a reporter for an

evening newscast in Patterson Springs, North Carolina, where he almost single-handedly put an end to corruption in the township's municipal court system. While Stephen is still in the journalism field - reaching an unequivocal status as the most respected newsman in television history - his professional journey has not been without deviations. Most notably amongst these was a short stint in a new wave band dubbed Stephen and the Colberts, who penned such classic

hits as "Why Won't You Return My Phone Calls," "I Don't Like That New Guy You're Seeing," and "Charlene (I'm Right Behind You)." What can you say; it was the 80s.

Though Colbert has done much over the course of his life, he still keeps a list of things to do before he dies. Reflecting his fanatical devotion to the United States, the list is comprised of how Stephen best feels he can honor the American way of life. An abridged cataloguing of these diverse interests includes:

- Wear stovepipe hat and bareknuckle fight Ted Kennedy
- Fly Blackhawk helicopter over San Francisco and throw Bibles at gay people
- Recite the pledge of allegiance in front of a flag flown from a Blackhawk helicopter by U.S. troops in Afghanistan during a combat mission called 'Beefhammer,'
- Drive Chevy pick-up full of barbecue sauce into world's largest hamburger"
