We're pretty unabashed rock 'n roll guys here at the Sidekick, so most of our Picks of the Issue have deviated little from singer/songwriters or straight up rock acts. Yet for this Pick of the Issue, our opinion of the best show coming up in or around Spokane over the next couple of weeks, we're selecting a metal lineup that's

deserving of the distinction. On Wednesday, May 30th, Italian goth outfit **Lacuna Coil** is headlining a night of music at The Blvd. that will also include the epic, dark rock of Dutch band **Within Temptation**, the driving metal of Savannah, Georgia's

Kylesah and the danceable, industrial vibe of **Stolen Babies**. All in all, a pretty bitchin' lineup in a great place to take in a metal show, especially one of this caliber. The night just begs for you to get drunk and fall down, earning a couple of battle wounds and undoubtedly having a hell of a time in the process.

Lacuna Coil combines hyper-fuzzy distortion with a dual male/female vocal arrangement and surprisingly beautiful piano pieces for an aggressive and distinct alt-metal sound. Though they're Italian, the majority of their lyrics are English

and they've recently started to capture the attention of American metalheads after an Ozzfest stint in 2003-04, after having been a major player in the heavy European scene for over a decade.

A lot of metal bands claim to bring a collision of melody and metal to the table, but that's a very difficult thing to pull off,

and Lacuna Coil does it as well as any band alive. It's also worth noting that Revolver and Rolling Stone magazines have confirmed what's been suspected for awhile, Lacuna Coil's lead singer Cristina Scabbia is one of the hottest chicks in the scene.

Within Temptation really deserves almost equal exposure, having sold over a million albums and creating a haunting, string-filled, guitar-fuelled sound that stays with you. This is definitely not a headlining show with opening filler acts that should be missed. If you're interested in our opinion, Kylesah is a bit heavy for our tastes, but the other three groups bring a lot of musical talent and enough diversity within the metal genre to make for an appealing, adrenaline-ridden concert.



The Cowboy

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LOCAL ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

SIX FOOT SWING

If it's true what they say, "It don't mean a thing if it ain't got that swing," then by all accounts, 6' Swing really means something. The seven piece Spokane based swing band is all about bringing back the swinging sound of the 20s.

6' Swing, pronounced "six foot swing," plays classic tunes reminiscent of a much different time in American music. They just finished recording their first CD and plan to release it at their upcoming show at Centerstage on May 24, where they will be opening for The Stolen Sweets. The six song demo highlights the group's ability to produce a genuine vintage sound half a century passed its peak.

Heather O'Brien delivers the lead vocals in a smooth jazzy voice, while the piano and horn section blend the music into the audio equivalent of a velvety piece of milk chocolate. 6' Swing is smooth and delicious. The group's founder and rhythm guitar player, Garrin Hertel, compensates for the lack of a drummer by strumming with the percussionist Jamie "Papa Scrubs" Flanery, who plays the washboard.

Hertel's love of jazz and swing is what brought this band together, and his love of the music started at a young age. On a family trip to New Orleans, Hertel got lost in the infamous French Quarter, and was inspired by a jazz musician.



"I wandered off and sat on a street corner . . . there was a piano player just killin' the keys, and I remember being really excited by that," he said.

The New Orleans influence on 6' Swing is apparent. They have a rendition of "Basin Street Blues" on their CD, which is a song that takes place in New Orleans. Hertel also organizes an annual jazz festival called "Think Swing" which gave jazz musicians from New Orleans the opportunity to come to Spokane to play since all their venues had been destroyed.

6' Swing, whose members are all at least six feet tall, has been pleasantly surprised by their success in the local music scene. They have found that although the music is old, it certainly isn't out. Their audiences range from middle aged to young groups of swingers who get dressed up and really tear up the dance floor. Sometimes the dancing is so acrobatic that the band finds



"We'd like to be able to say that someone fell in love dancing to our music,"

said Hertel.

Other future hopes for the band include travel, thought preferably not an intense tour schedule, but weekend trips to Portland, as well as eventually playing in the city that started it all; New Orleans.

6' Swing is a homegrown band that plays the charming and coy music of times past, while applying it to today's world. The energy is high and so is the fun. Whether they are playing a slow soft tune like "Night and Day," or their faster show stopper, "Georgia Grind," 6' Swing is authentic and original. Taking old classics and forgotten tunes and making the audience dance, washboard and all. Hertel maintains that even without a drummer, 6' Swing is every inch a true swing band.

"It's not so much the notes, as it is how you play them."

Six Foot Swing will be playing at Executive Women International, a springtime social and auction, on Friday, May 18th. There are 250 tickets for sale at \$35 a piece, available by calling Lori at 458-3200. Then, on May 24th, they'll be opening for the Portland swingin' jazz band Stolen Sweets at Centerstage, a show that will act as a CD release party of sorts for 6' Swing, as they'll be unveiling their recently finished 6 song demo, available at the show for \$6 a piece.

Looking ahead, they've got a bunch of shows lined up in June, with a Caterina performance on the 2nd, a couple return appearances at Centerstage on the 8th and 10th, and additional concerts at The Viking, The Ticket and Peacock Lounge towards the end of the month and into July. to be engaging across the board. From the soft, pop feel of solo artists Kori Henderson and Karli Fairbanks to the energetic, passionate vibe of the Shook


Twins and the rounded, quiet instrumentation of Vespertine, we would bet money on it being a chill – but not boring – evening of good music.

If there's one thing that every Spokanite knows, it's that nothing goes better with raw fish than educated Seattle hip-hop. Driving

the point home at Raw Sushi on the 18th will be the **Blue Scholars**, a ridiculously talented, hopelessly poetic duo from our big brother city to the west.

Though the Blue Scholars had the honor of being the only mainstage hip-hop artist at Sasquatch last year, as well

as a mainstage act at Bumbershoot, an appearance at a small local venue like Raw is hardly a rarity for the duo, as they've been known to show up for sets at youth run center shows and labor organizing conferences.

The tour is in anticipation of the group's third studio release *Bayani* set to hit shelves June 12th. The previous two (the first a full length self titled album, the second an eight-song EP titled *The Long March*) blend the contrasting styles of the two Scholars members, Emcee Geologic and DJ/producer Sabzi.

Geologic emerged from Seattle as a prominant battle MC and poet, while the ska and punk loving Sabzi trained in classical and jazz piano. Despite the diference in musical education, the two have created an anthemic, energetic energy that shines brightly on both studio productions to date. The self titled album is not only a stunningly precise critique of society (especially listening to

the album three years later) but an album that relies less on the hooks of popular hip-hop, or the quirkiness of underground, and more upon an amazing assortment of spoken word poetry, surrounded by flawless beats.

progressive jazz band Reptet out of Seattle. These two bands will also be joined by country punk rockers Williston. This 21 and older show will take place at the newly christened Zombie Room (formerly The Spread which was formerly the B-Side). The new owners of the Zombie

Room plan to keep everything the same with a commitment to good live music and good drinks all around.

While the Dry County Crooks aren't headlining the show, they are the first in our hearts. Playing a mix of outlaw country and punk influenced rock and roll, the

consists of Vinny D on vocals and guitar, Paul Becker on guitar, Johnny B on bass, and Cheo Larcombe on drums. Pulling from a songbook that ranges from Hank Sr. through Hank III, the band delivers a heartfelt message that can speak to all

ages and all moods. Whether you want to just watch a fun band perform or get out and dance like a drunken idiot, the Dry County Crooks will fulfill your every need.

Actually headlining the night is a progressive six piece jazz group called Reptet. The band is on tour promoting their new CD "Do This!" and they take pride in debunking peoples' preconceived notions of what jazz ought to be, instead bringing excitement, flair, and vision in a form of music that appeals to jazz aficionados and Joe Schmos alike.

Musically The Dry County Crooks and Reptet go together like oil and water, but anyone looking to see good live music will appreciate both acts for their talent and passion. The Zombie Room is located at 230 W. Riverside in downtown, Spokane on the same block as Prago Argentine Café. a majority of people that some factoid is true," he explained, leading into a digression about the African elephant population, which ultimately resulted in several hacked Wikipedia entries deliberately misinforming readers about the number of elephants tripling on the African continent over the last six month, a "factoid" that also happens to be patently untrue. While the segment was a downright hilarious parody of both Wikipedia's open source system and Stephen Colbert's disdain for facts and truth, it still has some interesting implications in the real world. Obviously one of – or

perhaps the – most important philosophical questions is the idea of what is real, which is usually described as either what exists or, if you subscribe to a wikiality-type notion of consensus reality, what we generally agree seems to exist (Like The Allegory of the

Cave and all that other stuff you slept through in college). It's also worth noting that Wikiality has caught on, to a certain extent, in the current lexicon. Global Language Monitor, which tracks language trends, named Colbert-coined phrases "truthiness" and "wikiality" the top TV buzzwords for 2006.

Washingtonian singer/songwriter and all around rockin' chick **Brandi Carlile** is coming to the Big Easy Concert House for a Thursday, May 24th performance. feel of vintage Supergrass or, especially, The Kinks, that makes it routinely engaging.



Music Lesson #2 Playing the Blues

I learned to play guitar with the blues. It's my favorite genre of music. Of course, I can't really call myself a true 'bluesman' because of my severe lack of sadness in life. I mean, the only heartache I've suffered through is the loss of loved ones and lovers. Then again, that's all you need to play the blues (it's just that if you lived though the Great Depression or the Black Plague you have more street-cred for enduring something truly horrible). Here's a short lesson on the blues for beginners or unfamiliar guitarists.

Figure 1 is the pentatonic scale, in E. The great thing about the pentatonic scale (it took me weeks to figure this out) is that you can start anywhere on the fret and follow the same pattern as Figure 1. A pentatonic in 'A' would start on the 5th fret of the top E string. A pentatonic in 'G' would start on the 3rd fret, and so on and so on. Therefore, you can play a solo over any song as long as you know the pentatonic and the key of the tune.

Figure 2 is a standard blues riff for rhythm guitar. Put together, these two exercises hold the most commonly used notes in the entire blues genre. The blues are my favorite because they can be super easy or super hard at the same time. Played rapidly, one can get that awesome SRV or Hendrix sound with slick, face melting solos. Played slowly you can achieve a melancholy, sexy (purely bluesy) sound like Clapton, B.B. King, and Mayer try to play. Whatever you want to make of it. My advice to you, if you're using this as a learning tool, is to become a master of the pentatonic scale by practicing A LOT! When I was in high school I would come home from school at 2:15, lock myself in a room with a guitar, and not come out till 8 p.m. I think it was a contributing factor to me not getting laid. However, practice makes perfect and no one can play the blues overnight. To this day, I try to get at least an hour or two of practice each day (probably why I'm still not getting laid!)

The Wikipedia Challenge (also called Wikirace or Wiki-Link Game)

Made popular in on-campus computer labs that often had filters on gaming websites, The Wikipedia Challenge is a game where competitors race from one designated start page to a predetermined finish article without ever leaving the Wikipedia network (i.e. clicking on in-site hyperlinks until reaching their destination). The winner can either be determined as the first person to reach the target page, or the one to do so using the fewest number of links.

At the end of the game, the winner can prove his or her path by clicking back through all the visited pages, thereby demonstrating that they never entered a new search or left the Wikipedia network.

While more fun than it probably should be no matter where you are, the game is particularly useful in school settings, where administrators might be a bit suspicious of your frantic clicking, but can't prove that you're not doing homework since you're operating within





Sexual Predators, Loyal Bushies and of the disappearance of accountability

Call me naïve, but I don't see how hypocrisy of this magnitude can be so pervasive. Sure, you're bound to get a few bad apples in an any prodigious body of people like the government, but this is just insane. I mean I

haven't even mentioned the Iraq debacle, the biggest fuckup of our generation, that was clearly a disaster on every level, and one with no end in sight.

It would be a little easier to swallow pill after deceptive pill if there was any sign of remorse, but I see no indication that that's the case. Alberto Gonzales apparently contracted a wicked case of amnesia when under investigation for trying to replace U.S. Attorneys boasting good performance records with "loyal Bushies," feigning forgetfulness most of the time then lying through the rest. Ted Haggard, the foremost gay-bashing preacher that the Conservative Christian base had to offer turned out to be a male prostitue-visiting, meth addict who simply said he was "cured" of his homosexual ways, and that was about the extent of his apology.

And don't even think about failure, because "failure is not an option," which the document repeatedly states.



28 Weeks Later a worthy, gory sequel

You could probably file the 2001 release 28 Days Later in any of a number of genres or sub-genres: thriller, action, horror, science fiction, drama, or anything with the word "apocalyptic" in it would seem fairly logical to me. That's not really the case with the sequel, however; 28 Weeks Later is pretty much a straight up horror film.



insinuate that 28 Weeks Later is better than the original, though. That's not the case at all (see below). But as a sort-of edge-of-your-seat horror flick where everyone's running around in full-blown survival mode, it works pretty well. You could dig a little deeper and find something at stake about cowardice paying a heavy price – or other vaguely humanitarian concerns that are somewhat contrived and somewhat interesting – but there's rarely enough time to reflect on little more than, "Run you fools," or "Jesus, did that dude just take a bite out of her jugular?"

It's worth noting that you probably want to check out the first film before going to the sequel. I suppose that's a pretty obvious thing to say, but it's particularly true in this case. Since the characters and

storyline are completely new, 28 Weeks
Later is a self-contained movie, but if
you miss out on how all of it started
I imagine it would be difficult to
really get the full effect.

The aforementioned subtext that runs quietly rampant throughout the film is fairly interesting, but not nearly as pronounced or enticing as the original. In the end, it makes 28 Weeks Later less self-reflexive and

therefore probably a little easier to get



immediately lost in, but it also makes it much less interesting. I realize it's probably annoying to read a review about a movie that keeps referencing another, but it's nearly impossible to separate the two. The schizophrenic feel of handheld camera movements is amped-up to an almost nauseating level, yet the look and feel is essentially the same. Even the soundtrack is, for all practical purposes, identical. Everything has changed, yet it's still somehow

exactly the same, an admittedly stupid claim that probably makes perfect sense if you've seen both of the flicks.

That's really all there is to say about 28 Weeks Later. If you enjoyed the predecessor, but thought it skimped on the explosions and decapitations, then this is pretty much what you've been waiting for. Hollywood has gone way too far in turning out safe little sequels but, as far as follow-ups go, this is sure to be one of the best of the summer.

I think a lot of people would agree with the claim that some of the most rewarding viewing experiences come about when you know or expect little out of the movie you're

and the soundtrack is one of my favorites of all time. The whole world of the film is constructed in an engaging, entertaining way that confirmed any previous suspicions I'd harbored about Danny Boyle being an extremely talented filmmaker.

This nearly brand-new studio is the brainchild of musician Mark Klock and his wife Angel. Located about an hour and a half north of Spokane (just north of Chewelah), the studio is far removed from the noise and frantic distractions of the city. According to Klock, "When we first started building the studio two years ago we had the option of moving to Spokane but instead we chose to set up shop way out here and make it a sort of getaway for musicians. There is nothing up here to distract you – you have to concentrate on your music."

History

Klock, a graduate of the UCLA audio engineering program, officially started Fusion Studios in 2003 for his own private use in recording his own musical projects. A lifelong musician, he was frustrated with expensive studios that didn't deliver the quality he desired. Fusion Studios was his solution and he eventually opened it up to the public.

Two years ago Klock moved to Washington to begin the yearlong process of constructing a brand new studio next to his ranch. The custom building was designed by Klock and was created to meet his needs as both an engineer and a musician.

"The goal was to build a creative atmo-



sphere with a relaxing vibe that takes your mind off the world and focuses it on the music," explains Klock. "From everything I've heard from bands that come to the studio, we have succeeded in that goal. And they all love it so much they've all come back for their next project."

The Building

Fusion Studios is a building separate from the living spaces and features a control suite, a massive live room, and one isolation booth. The live room features 20-foot high ceilings and delivers an enormous sound. Under the hood of the studio is a 32 track British Soundtracs analog-mixing board modified to provide more headroom and a punchier sound.

"The analog board provides a more warm, natural sound that can't be achieved through digital means," explain Klock. "Metal guitarists really love the punchiness we are able to create with this board."

The Equipment

Recordings done at Fusion Studio may be mixed through an analog mixer but they are recorded on the studio's Mackie hard disc recorder system with industry leading Apogee digital/analog converters. The studio also features two full racks of pre-amps, more off-board gear than a non-engineer can understand, nine custom modified mics, two studio drums sets, Mesa Boogie Stilletto tube heads, and more (a full list is available online at www.fusionstudio.biz).

When Klock relocated to Spokane he had a goal to build a studio that was as much a creative sanctuary as it is place to record. When band's come into the studio they stay for a few days in the Klock's guest rooms until the project is done. The distance from the city serves at a buffer against anything that might be a distraction during the recording process.

"Coming to record at Fusion Studio is kind of like going on vacation," jokes Klock.



Wikipedia Spin-offs and Parodies



The Spokane Civic Theatre is closing the doors on their 2006-2007 season of plays with the lavish musical **The Sound of Music**. I feel kind of silly even attempting to describe The Sound of Music because, if you've no idea what it's about, then you might want to consider getting a library card and a Blockbuster account. The story centers around a schoolteacher bringing a love of music (and the naming of her favorite things) to the Austrian hills, specifically the house of the von Trapp family (von Trapp, of course, being Austrian for lovable, suspender-clad dorks).

Besides "My Favorite Things," The Sound of Music also includes the canonical tunes "Do Re Me," "Climb Every Mountain," and between six and seven thousand others. The local production is directed by Yvonne A.K. Johnson, with musical direction by Gary Laing.

The only exception to this is the Wednesday, May 30th performance, which is being thrown as a benefit to raise money for a new air conditioner at the Civic Theatre. 
Due to our using Wikipedia for a borderline unprofessional level of internet research, we've identified a near phenomenon we call The Wikipedia Corollary. Thai Bamboo Redux

Back in January of this year, the SiDEKiCK visited Thai Bamboo's South Hill store to see how Spokane's largest Thai establishment fared against our picky palettes. We found the restaurant to be outstanding in every way except in one small instance – I thought their calamari sucked. According to my previous review "Thai Bamboo's problem was that the calamari itself looked and tasted like something I would get from Skippers – manufactured and mass-produced. While their Thai dipping sauce was awesome, the calamari itself wasn't worthy of the sauce."

To my surprise they read the review and listened. I got an email from Thai Bamboo owner Tom Burgess about a month ago telling me that they were now serving homemade calamari rings and he was confident that they would pass the test. At first I thought this might be a ploy to kidnap me and feed me a Hannibal Lecter style meal of my own brain. So I sent my assistant in first to scout out the situation. He returned in one piece with tales of calamari rings that were "outstanding."

The calamari that arrived at my table was 1000% percent better than the nasty old stuff I'd blasted back in January. The problem before was that the calamari rings

The calamari at Thai Bamboo has come along way since the first time we ate there. It's now the way calamari should be, lightly breaded with a perfect amount of seasoning and large chunks of squid tentacle. The sauce they serve it with is nothing to be laughed at either; it's the perfect light, slightly sweet and tangy sauce to accompany good calamari. And don't forget to try some of their Thai iced tea. It is absolutely delicious!

were 10% meat and 90% greasy breading. Now it's the opposite with big, chunky rings that actually give you something to bite into and a crispy breading that doesn't overwhelm the ring in both size and taste. While the actual calamari rings received a major overhaul, the sweet Thai dipping sauce that came with the dish was the same great sauce that I had back in January. The sauce was the cornerstone to the whole experience since it made the rings come alive in your mouth and gave the calamari a distinctively Thai flavor.

In my previous article I claimed that I hadn't found a restaurant in Spokane that

made good calamari – after last night I can now say there are at least three (since Thai Bamboo has three Spokane locations with a new Coeur D'Alene one in the works). I want to believe there are more but I have yet to find them. I am open to suggestions.


